

Marshall Asks Europe Initiate Recovery Bid

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 5.—(P)—Secretary of State Marshall called today upon the countries of Europe to take the "initiative" in drafting a reconstruction program to put that continent on its feet economically and promised American assistance "so far as it may be practical."

He coupled this pledge with a warning that the United States would oppose anyone seeking to profit by perpetuating "human misery"—whether they be government or political parties.

Speaking before the Harvard

alumni after that university awarded him an honorary doctorate of laws, Marshall mentioned no foreign country by name as he gave a broad outline of America's long-range foreign policy.

Asserting a "very serious situation is rapidly developing" in Europe which "bodes no good for the world," the secretary said:

"The rehabilitation of the economic structure of Europe quite evidently will require a much longer time and greater effort than had been foreseen."

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Commercial Sugar Users Get Increase

Marion county's commercial sugar users Thursday received a 10 per cent increase in their sugar allowances, when official notice of increase was made by the U.S. department of agriculture.

Final decision followed advance notice to sugar users and was relayed here by telegram from Rep. Walter Norblad. Reason for the increase here and in Yamhill and Lane counties was cited as the greatly increased population since 1941, the base year for sugar allotment.

Bakers and other commercial users are affected, but the increase will not put more sugar into the hands of housewives, according to Theodore Roth, president of Willamette Grocery Co. Roth predicted, however, that home sugar users before long will be getting more sugar than present rationing allow.

Principal business affected by the increase is the canning industry in which the various canning firms here receive their sugar direct from refineries.

Norman Cary, cost accountant for Paulus Bros. cannery, said this increase brings sugar supply to the level of cannery use in 1941, the base year for the present allotment system (which until the effective date of June 1 allowed local canneries 90 per cent of the 1941 base).

To Improve Products

Cary pointed out that the sugar increase probably will improve grades of local canned products rather than raise total output, inasmuch as the sugar allowance is based on average use per case to allow for fluctuations in production.

Grange Overwhelmingly Opposes State Sales Tax

BEND, June 5.—(P)—The Oregon state grange clung to its historic opposition to the sales tax today, voting overwhelmingly to demand a referendum on the tax.

Only about 20 of the 420 delegates, grange officials said, voted against the referendum proposal which was, in effect, a denunciation of the sales tax.

U.S. to Ignore New Nicaragua Regime

WASHINGTON, June 5.—(P)—The United States today cold-shouldered the new Nicaraguan regime headed by Dr. Anastasio Somoza, who seized power in a coup.

Without waiting for a final decision by the other American republics, this government made known it is not disposed at this time to have official relations with the regime.

2 Professors Added to Local College Staff

Three new appointments to the Willamette university include those of two new professors and one graduate manager of the school, succeeding Dr. Robert E. Lantz, who recently resigned to become superintendent of the Woodburn schools.

The Rev. Raymond A. Withey, Jr., will be counselor of religious education and Dr. George Berry Martin will be professor and head of the education department, both appointments effective this fall.

Withey acquired his B.A. and M.A. degrees at Harvard and will receive his Ph.D. degree from Boston college in August. He has taught school in northern New York. Dr. Martin attended the University of California and will come here from Berkeley where he was principal of Columbia school. He is moderator of the Northern California conference of the Congregational church.

Dr. Schultz, now professor of German at Willamette, will become graduate manager after Dr. Lantz relinquishes the duties on July 1. Manager's duties include supervision of student activities supported by the student fees.

Rainier Wife Killed; Police Seek Husband

RAINIER, June 5.—(P)—Carl Alford was sought today for questioning in the death of his 21-year-old wife, Evelyn, who was shot through the chest in her home here last night.

A 4-year-old daughter, Patricia, found her mother this morning lying on a cot in her kitchen, her arms neatly folded above the bullet wound. Mrs. Alford's father, George Cameron, came in shortly afterward to see the little girl trying to shake her mother awake. A younger child, 2-year-old Virgil, was asleep in his crib.

City Marshal S. N. Campbell said the dead woman's husband was reported to have boarded the McCollom ferry for Longview last night. The marshal sent out a call for the man.

Mill City Man Hurt As Lumber Falls

MILL CITY, June 5.—Earl Sayre of Marion was seriously injured here at 4:30 p. m. today when a load of lumber fell on him and he incurred a fractured leg and rib, two pelvic fractures and four fractured vertebrae, according to the attending physician.

He was taken to Salem Deaconess hospital and is said to be getting along satisfactorily, in view of his injuries.

The accident occurred at the Mill City Cleaning mill, where Sayre, employed by the Frank Lumber Co., at Mill City, was unloading the lumber.

Vets Charge Nip-American With Treason

LOS ANGELES, June 5.—(P)—A short, squat Japanese of American birth was arrested on treason charges by federal officers late today after an American soldier, who identified him as a foreman in a prison camp at Oeyama, Honshu island, said he had subjected United States captives to "unspeakable indignities."

The prisoner, 25-year-old Tomoya Kawakita, was held for the federal grand jury which will take up the matter of his indictment June 11. Kawakita, bespectacled and clad in natty sports clothes, appeared near tears during his arraignment.

Richard Hood, FBI chief here, said, investigation had disclosed that Kawakita had obtained a passport in 1939 to go to Japan, ostensibly to study at Keiji university. He returned to the United States August 15, 1946, after obtaining a passport in Yokohama on the representation he had continued only as a student during the war years, the federal officer said.

Kawakita's arrest was credited to the alertness of William L. Bruce, Buena Park, Calif., a former American soldier who knew Kawakita in the camp as "Kaw-Kida."

FBI Agent William A. Murphy, San Diego, said that Bruce was amazed to spot Kawakita in a Los Angeles department store, and that he followed him and jotted down the license number of his car.

"All of us in the camp knew this fellow. When he wasn't actually forcing us to submit to indignities, he was coaxing some of the Jap soldiers into some devilish plans to harass us."

"All of us agreed, after hearing him brag about having been born in the United States, that if we ever saw him again we would kill him."

Master Sgt. Ralph W. Montgomery, Fort MacArthur, Calif., another former prisoner, told Murphy, the officer said, that Kawakita appeared to take satisfaction in seeing Americans degraded in the presence of Japanese soldiers.

Carrier Upkeep Costs Would Top \$100,000 a Year

The question was raised here Thursday as to whether Portland's acceptance of the aircraft carrier Enterprise as a war relic, under terms of the United States navy, would make it incumbent upon the state to contribute to its upkeep.

Information received here from the 13th naval district indicated that the cost of maintenance would exceed \$100,000 a year.

It was recalled that back in 1925 when the battleship Oregon was turned over to the state the legislature was called upon for money to maintain the ship. During the life of the old battleship in Portland the state appropriated \$267,348.94 for its upkeep.

Plane Aids Snell to Meet Commitments

Gov. Earl Snell participated in two affairs in widely separated points in the state Thursday.

The governor traveled by airplane to Union where he addressed the Union Livestock association meeting. Returning to Salem late in the afternoon he drove to Lebanon where he crowned the queen of the strawberry festival there. He also spent two or three hours in his office.
