Canned Hash Makes Summertime Main Dishes: Variety Is Suggested

Someone once said that hash is the biggest individual cause for divorce, but in our opinion it is a lack of skill in making it rather than too-frequent serving of a good product that might cause lack of appreciation.

Of all the favored meats for making hash, corned beef is the most frequently lauded by experts.

Now the fact that there's a large amount of corned beef hash in cans on the grocers' shelves must indicate one of two things, either that it's a popular item or that it is a hard one to sell.

Here are some ways to make short cut cookery from tin canned hash for summertime meals:

HAWAIIAN CORNED BEEF HASH SANDWICH

No. 2 can sliced pineapple
No. 2 can corned beef hash
4 1/2 tablespoons chili sauce
1 1/2 teaspoons prepared mustard
1 1/2 teaspoons vinegar
3 tablespoons brown sugar

Brush baking pan with fat. Lay five slices pineapple in pan. Remove both ends from can of corned beef hash and push hash out in mold form. Cut into five
