

West Salem Water Deal Signed; Action Given Street Changes

A contract to provide Salem water as an auxiliary supply to West Salem was signed Monday night by action of the Salem city council. Regular Salem water rates will be charged and the supply is expected to ease the effect of the annual summer drought in West Salem.

The council also passed a property assessment ordinance to permit a \$10,000 improvement of Nebraska street between 15th and 20th streets, and new bills were introduced for improvement of Hill from 17th to 19th streets, Nebraska from 20th to 21st street, to establish grades on several streets in east Salem between Market and D streets, and to accept donated property for extending South 16th street.

Marion VFW post's request for a downtown club license was denied, although the council received Police Chief Frank Minto's recommendation that such a permit would be satisfactory if used at the present VFW hall on Hood street. The downtown location for a VFW club was listed as 222½ N. Commercial st.

Franzen was ordered by the council to study possible actions the city may take in mosquito control for this summer, at the instigation of Alderman Howard Maple.

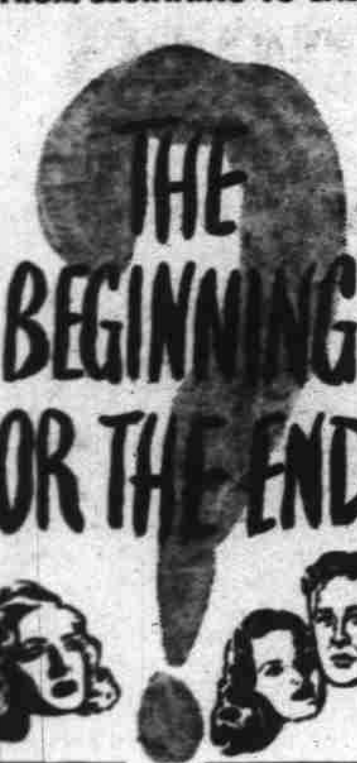
D street was made a through street at 20th, 21st and Thompson streets where stop signs were ordered erected. Placed on the list of street projects to be carried out at property owners' expense were North 19th from Grant to Garfield, Pine from Church to Maple and Academy from Front to Commercial streets.

A new ordinance bill to permit schools and similar projects in residential areas without zone change was introduced at the behest of Salem school district and was referred to the city planning and zoning commission. Another bill would permit smoking in rest rooms of public dance halls, but not on the dance floor.

Fund Cut May Slash School Lunch Program

Burden of carrying on the noon hot-lunch program in Marion county schools would shift almost entirely from federal to private or district funds, if the proposed congressional legislation to cut the program's appropriation by almost three-fourths goes through, the county school superintendent's office said Monday.

Twenty-three schools in the county now share in the federal funds, the office said. Meals now cost about 20 cents. Of this amount only from 3 to 4 cents is paid by the government and the rest by the school districts.

"If appropriations are cut still further, federal contribution to the lunch program will be about 1 cent per meal, which is hardly enough of an incentive to carry on the program in those school districts which cannot afford it," an office spokesman said.

Under proposed legislation Oregon's school lunch allocation would be reduced from \$467,944 to \$150,000 next year.

'Deflation' Period Seen for 6 Months

GEARHART, Ore., June 9—(P)—A six-months period of "deflation, but no depression" was predicted here today by Dr. G. W. Dowrie, Stanford university professor emeritus of finance.

He told the Oregon Bankers association that the entire nation would experience deflation, falling prices and business decline in the coming half-year.

This he characterized as a "wholesome readjustment of unbalanced war-time economy and not a recession or depression."

Oregon's Roads To Be Studied For 'Future'

Oregon's roads and highways will be studied with an eye to transportation problems of the future and the most efficient uses of highway revenues, in a comprehensive survey by the non-profit Automotive Safety foundation of Washington, D. C.

This was decided Monday by the 1947 legislature's interim committee on highway development and revenue after Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock indicated "the time has arrived for such a survey."

The committee said it would ask the state highway commission to earmark \$25,000 for expenses of the foundation in the survey over a year and for such additional funds as needed for an executive secretary and extra work required of the highway department in connection with the road study.

J. Donald Kennedy, foundation manager who was present at the statehouse meeting, said the survey would consider county roads and city streets as well as the state highways. He explained that the foundation is supported by the automotive trades. J. O. Madsen of Oregon State college, who supervises foundation work in 11 western states, also attended the meeting.

In its initial meeting the committee organized with State Sen. Douglas McKay as temporary chairman and State Sen. Ernest Fatland temporary secretary. Organization will be completed July 12.

Japan to Get World Trade

WASHINGTON, June 9—(P)—The international trade door to Japan will be reopened to private business on a limited scale on August 15, the state and war departments announced tonight.

This announcement followed the return of the United States trade mission from conferences with Gen. Douglas MacArthur and his headquarters staff in Tokyo.

The mission reported that the first step toward normal trade relations with the defeated Japanese would be accommodations in Japan for 400 private trade representatives in the main industrial and commercial areas, allocated among the allied nations on a percentage basis.

Third Infant Feared Victim

MASSILLON, O., June 9—(P)—Prosecutor D. Deane McLaughlin said tonight search has been made for a third baby feared missing from City hospital's pediatrics ward where two other babies were found with their skulls crushed last Friday night.

Reviving the theory that the two baby girls may have been murdered by a demented slayer, McLaughlin discounted the belief the pair died accidentally.

Veto Believed More Probable On Tax Bill

WASHINGTON, June 9—(P)—A presidential veto of the tax reduction bill at noon next Monday became a strong possibility today, to be followed within four days by action on the measure for curbing unions.

As President Truman left by train tonight for a three-day official visit to Canada, his press secretary, Charles G. Ross, announced that White House action on both measures will be put off until after his return Friday night.

This means that a veto message cannot be sent to congress until the house meets at noon (EDT) Monday, for it will be in recess Saturday and Sunday and presidential messages to the capital are never released except when the chamber to which they are addressed is sitting.

If the president's decision were to sign the tax bill, he could do so Saturday. But if his disposition had been made to accept this measure, which he already has had for study since the middle of last week, it seemed probable that he would have done so speedily in order that the treasury could get the machinery under way for putting the tax cuts into effect by July 1, as the bill would require. New pay roll withholding schedules would have to be put into force.

A torrent of letters and post cards on the two controversial bills has swelled the volume of White House mail close to record proportions. Elva Ayers, presidential press aide, reported 100,000 letters and 350,000 post cards have been received to date and said the "great majority" appeal for a veto of the labor bill.

Phone Union Sees Merger

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., June 9—(P)—Joseph A. Beirne, officiating at the birth of the Communications Workers of America, here today, predicted a merger of the CIO and AFL and urged the new telephone union to affiliate with the merged labor movement.

He took no position on joining either the Congress of Industrial Organizations or the American Federation of Labor before that time.

Beirne, temporary president of the CWA, was leader of the recent telephone strike.

The new union claims about 161,000 dues-paying members and claims to represent under contract about 220,000 telephone workers. It succeeds the National Federation of Telephone Workers which was dissolved yesterday.

Pro-Sales Tax Drive Started

With about 50 persons in attendance from over the state the campaign to put over a sales tax at the state election October 7 got underway at a meeting at the Marion hotel Monday afternoon.

W. A. Johnson, county judge of Josephine county and chairman of the sponsoring committee, presided. Earl Hill, representative from Lane county, assisted in the meeting as manager of the campaign.

A number of persons were heard who emphasized the need for Oregon's adopting a sales tax to relieve the burden on property and incomes and to finance needs of the public treasury.

Plans were discussed for setting up county organizations to conduct the campaign through the summer and fall.

No Decision Reached On Heights' Water

SALEM HEIGHTS, June 9—A public meeting of the Salem Heights water board Monday night arrived at no final conclusion on choosing the manner of hook-up with the Salem water system in order to solve this community's summer water shortage problems. John Brimacombe was chairman of the meeting. The board's regular meetings on the second Monday of each month will continue through the summer.

County Probes Roselle Death; Inquest Slated

Investigation by Marion county Sheriff Denver Young into the gunshot death of Mrs. Laura Roselle, 43, at her home in West Stayton Saturday evening, was being continued Monday.

An inquest will be held Saturday, District Attorney Miller B. Hayden said. An autopsy report definitely established death as caused by a bullet fired from a .30 calibre German luger pistol, Hayden said. The report also revealed the fatal wound was made in the mouth.

Husband of the deceased woman, Hugh Roselle, logger, told of the death. He belonged to his wife. He told officers, according to Hayden, that he and his wife had come home from a visit to Stayton about 6 p. m. Saturday. After chopping some wood in a woodshed near the house he entered the home to find his wife lying on a bedroom floor. He said he heard no shot, according to Hayden.

The body is at Weddle mortuary in Stayton, awaiting funeral arrangements. Mrs. Roselle is also survived by Ruth, 17, who was not at home at the time of the accident.

Mt. McKinley Scaled For Fourth Time

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9—(P)—A telegram from Alaska told today of the successful scaling of 20,300-foot Mt. McKinley, North America's highest peak — the fourth successful venture in history.
