Pivotal Issues Stage Retreat In Stock Mart

NEW YORK, June 12—(AP)—Many pivotal issues retreated in the stock market today although enough bullish sentiment remained to give the list a spotty appearance.

Losses ranging to more than a point were registered by leading steels, motors, rubbers and some other industrials. Selective demand kept a few favorites well forward.

The session started at an active pace but slowed after noon and transfers totaled 1,040,000 shares against 1,350,000 on Wednesday's rally.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite declined .2 of a point to 62.6 or 989 issues registering, pivotal shares accounted for many of the 326 declines, while advances totaled 449.

American Telephone, which lagged behind Wednesday's upswing, dipped today to a new 1947 low, closing off 1 1/2 at 157 1/2. Chrysler was down 2 at 103. Others a point or more lower included the recently rising Texas Pacific Land Trust at 23, U. S. Steel at 66 1/2, Youngstown Sheet at 59 1/2, Goodyear at 42 1/2, Montgomery Ward at 56 1/2, J. I. Case at 33 1/2 and American Can at 93. Pepsi-Cola dipped fractionally but Coca-Cola established a new 1947 high with a 5-point jump to close at 169 1/2. Also on the upside were Norfolk & Western, ahead 3 at 229; Remington Rand, up 1 at 31 1/2 on a stock split proposal; International Harvester, 1 1/2 at 85; Douglas Aircraft, 1 at 53 1/2, and U. S. Gypsum 1 1/2 at 100 1/4.

Border Peace Said Key to Greek Stability

WASHINGTON, June 12—(AP)—Mark F. Ethridge, American member of the United Nations Balkan inquiry commission, said after a meeting with Secretary of State Marshall today that border security is the primary requirement for restoration of stability in Greece.

Ethridge plans to confer tomorrow with Dwight Griswold, director of the American assistance program in Greece. Griswold is en route to Washington from Germany where he was one of the top officials on the American government staff.

Ethridge spent about 25 minutes with Marshall and said only that the secretary asked about the work of the inquiry commission and Ethridge told him about it.

Over 150 Attend Men's Garden Club Dinner Meeting

More than 150 attended the Salem Men's Garden club no-host dinner meeting in the 4-H club building at the state fairgrounds with members of the Portland, Corvallis and Albany clubs attending by special invitation of the local club. The visits will be returned during the summer.

Clarence S. Chase of the Chase gardens at Eugene told of a new early blooming orchid discovered in South America which he brought to Eugene, where he grows more orchids than any producer in the west. He is now beginning to cultivate the March and April blooming orchids after having brought them last summer from the South American neighbors. Several years are required in order for orchids to bloom.

The meeting, first outside gathering of a series during the summer, also featured an informal flower show.

Great Books Group Grows

Salem's recently organized Great Books discussion group already has grown to the point where two such classes seem likely for next fall. City Librarian Hugh Morrow said last night after a group at the meeting at the library to discuss Plato's "Gorgias."

Forty men and women discussed the dissertation on justice under the guidance of Marie Smeed and Kurt Schlegel, Portland volunteer leaders in the Great Books movement. Among the 40 present were four from Corvallis. Morrow said the local group will discuss Thucydides' Histories (books 1 through 6) at a 7:30 p.m. meeting June 26, again under volunteer leadership from Portland. When the local class resumes in September it will have its own leaders.

'Buckskin' Hits Ashland Cherries

ASHLAND, June 12—(AP)—"Buckskin," a deadly virus disease, threatens to exterminate this region's once famed cherry orchards, C. B. Cordy, southern Oregon extension service agent, said today.

T. S. Wiley, Ashland mayor, said the disease has grown to the point where there will be virtually no commercial cherry crop here this year.

There is no known control for the infestation, which spread here from Napa county, Calif.

Late Selling Boosts Grains

CHICAGO, June 12—(AP)—Heavy selling in the last 30 minutes of trading produced a sharp trend reversal on the Board of Trade today, wiping out gains in all pits and substituting wide losses. Trading was active on the decline.

Wheat finished 1 1/2 to 2 cents lower, July \$2.14 1/2-1/2, corn was down 3 to 5 1/2, July \$1.46 1/2-1/2, and soybeans 1 1/2-2 1/2 lower, July \$9.55 1/2-1/2.

Hedging pressure and a reduction of a cent a bushel in the CCC wheat buying price caused the slump in the bread grain, which has declined every day this week. The CCC at Kansas City was offering \$2.28 1/2 a bushel for wheat in store, trade advisers said.
