MILL CITY—Funeral services were held Tuesday for Fred Bert Shaw who died June 7 at a Salem hospital, at the Weddle chapel in Stayton. Interment was in the Fox Valley cemetery.

Shaw was born Sept. 7, 1876 in New York state. He had been ill since Easter. He came to Oregon in 1913 and had followed the logging industry and was an engineer until his illness in a camp near "Little Sweden." In his earlier life he had studied for the ministry in the Quaker church and was active also in the United Brethren and Methodist churches. Survivors include the widow, Clara; two sons, Elmer of Mill City, John of Los Angeles; a stepson in North Bend; grandchildren, Vern Shaw of Mill City and Audrey and Velma Shaw of Mill City.

Smuggling of Jews to Halt, Hagana Says

JERUSALEM, June 12—(AP)—A spokesman for Hagana, Jewish underground group which has been sponsoring the smuggling of Jews from Europe into Palestine, said yesterday. It was halting its immigration activities temporarily "because of new difficulties at ports of embarkation."

The spokesman told the Associated Press that no ships were en route to the Holy Land with uncertified immigrants and that "none are due in the immediate future."

Measures taken at European ports to thwart the exodus of Jews to Palestine, he said, have made it "virtually impossible to provision ships for long sea voyages."

"There are, however, many ships and thousands of Jews awaiting a chance for the journey, and they will sail as soon as we surmount these new obstacles," he declared.

Robber Slugs Lila Moriarity

Lila Moriarity was struck on the head and robbed of \$7 from her purse early Thursday morning by someone who entered her apartment at 674 S. Capitol st., according to city police investigations.

Miss Moriarity was alone when the robbery occurred. She told police she had fallen asleep and awakened to a strange noise and, upon investigating, was struck a blow on the head by an assailant who went unrecognized, in the dark. First aid men treated her injuries.

Snyder Hints at Tax Cut Veto

WASHINGTON, June 12—(AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Snyder said Wednesday that "we must

know that our expenditures are going to be before we cut our revenues," thereby raising new speculations of a veto for the income tax reduction bill.

Snyder, the president's chief adviser on taxes and government finance, told a news conference that congress acted "hastily" in voting to cut taxes before it "set the pattern of expenditures."

He observed that so far congress has not completed action on "a single appropriations bill."
