

Pat Raymond Denies Beating Capt. Tatum

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13—(AP)—A waterfront night club operator took the witness stand in his first degree murder trial here today to deny he had killed Ship Capt. Frank B. Tatum, 53, Billerica, Mass., in a fight last January.

Contradicting testimony by two men who said they witnessed the fight, the night club owner, Patrick Raymond, 40, said, "I definitely did not kick the captain at any time. I never jump on anyone, particularly someone I like as I did the captain."

The fight came about, he testified, because of a drinking bet "whether Tatum could down ten jiggers of whisky as Raymond had. Tatum drank only five, then became argumentative, Raymond, who was indicted as Patrick O'Day, said.

Said Captain Alive
He added that the captain was alive and emitting "good old healthy snores" when carried from the club after the fight.

earlier on the fight also admitted they carried Tatum from the club and dumped his body over an embankment in an exclusive Hillside residential district. They said they believed the captain dead.

Plead Guilty
They were John Snyder, 20, and Harold Sehorn, 25, once indicted with Raymond on first degree murder charges, who pleaded guilty to reduced charges of manslaughter and testified against the night club operator.

Tatum's body was found at the foot of the embankment a week after it had been dumped there.

Carson to Head Willamette U. Law Alumni

Allan G. Carson was elected president of the Willamette university college of law Alumni association and the group adopted a committee recommendation to establish three funds for the law college at its Friday night meeting in the Marion hotel. Carson succeeds J. B. Bedingfield of Coos Bay, elected president at the group's formation here last November.

John Ebinger of Klamath Falls was elected vice president and Joseph B. Felton, Salem attorney and district judge is the new secretary-treasurer.

The law college funds will be for scholarships, loans and a publication fund for law review. Donations to the funds will first go to the publication fund and surplus will be contributed to the scholarship and loan funds.

Bedingfield, Judge Charles Redding of the Multnomah circuit court and Frank Van Dyke of Grants Pass were elected to the executive committee.

Justice George B. Simpson, class of 1907, of the Washington state supreme court, was the oldest of the nearly 100 members attending. Attorney General George Neuner and C. L. Starr of the Willamette board of trustees also attended.

Speakers were University President G. Herbert Smith, Law School Dean Seward P. Reese, Justice Simpson and Starr.

State Tax Office Behind Schedule

Processing of 1946 state income tax returns is 27 days behind schedule, while auditing of returns is three years behind schedule. State Tax Commissioner Earl Fisher said Friday.

Fisher said the reason for the delay is lack of working space.

The last legislature authorized the commission to hire 69 additional workers, but Fisher said it can't find room for them to work. He said the lack of space to house auditors is causing the state to lose thousands of dollars each year.

A-Commission Fund Cut Due

WASHINGTON, June 13—(AP)—Budget cuts ranging from 30 per cent for the atomic energy commission to 12 per cent for the veterans administration were ordered today by the White house appropriations committee.

The committee acted in sending to the house floor an \$8,168,869.027 appropriation bill supplying funds for the fiscal year starting July 1 for 33 so-called "independent offices"—the agencies not connected with any of the regular departments headed by cabinet secretaries.
