"Children should be helped any place where they can be helped, but I want to have a hand in raising my children and not have them raised by experts," Dr. Horace Miller of the Oregon State hospital staff told members of the Marion county Social workers conference at its annual meeting and luncheon Friday.

Too many groups of trained workers, such as psychiatrists, physicians, educators and social workers tend to come to the point where they act as if "just let us arrange things for people and everything will be fine," the speaker said.

After discussing the other two groups, he said, "Did you think I had forgotten the social workers? Many of them have this idea in the back of their mind. These fields are means to an end, not the end, Dr. Miller stressed.

House Beats Bill to Pay For Housing with Bonds

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The house rejected 137 to 100 Thursday a proposal that veterans be allowed to use their terminal leave bonds in part payment for homes built by the government during wartime and soon to be sold.

The vote, on a teller count, came after Reps. Van Zandt (R-Pa.) and Miller (R-Conn.) declared such a move would discriminate against those veterans who could not use the bonds for the
