

### 88 Exhaust Vets' Jobless Pay in Oregon

Nearly half of Oregon's 123,000 returned service men and women have drawn readjustment allowances under the GI bill of rights but only one in 88 has exhausted his allotted amounts ranging up to 52 weeks at \$20 a week, records of the state unemployment compensation disclosed here Saturday.

As of June 1, 69,599 veterans' claims were on file, 54,218 had had at least one payment, and 1,390 had had their last check under the GI bill. Of the latter 702 were unemployed and 688 self-employed.

Only 3,993 veterans received checks during the first week of June, a number less than a third of the 13,225 paid in February and less than half of the 9,371 paid during the first week of June, 1946.

Last year's top was 15,322, also in February.

In the nearly three years since the national legislation became effective the Oregon commission has paid \$15,773,605 to veterans. Of this, \$2,932,285 went to self-employed service men and women while the remainder was for those unable to find suitable work.

### Government May Act To Help Stem Crashes

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Hurried White house conferences were held today as the result of the death of 50 persons in the plane crash near Leesburg, Va., and there were reports of imminent government action designed to halt such accidents.

James M. Landis, chairman of the civil aeronautics board, conferred at the executive mansion with John R. Steelman, presidential assistant.

### Hungary Russ Defy U.S. Plan

BUDAPEST, Sunday, June 15 (AP)—The Russian commander in Budapest today refused, for the third time, an American proposal for a tri-partite investigation of Hungarian internal affairs.

A note refusing the investigation proposal which was sent to Brig. Gen. George H. Weems, commander of the United States military mission in Hungary, added: "The American charge that communists had assumed control in Hungary and that the will of the people who had voted for the smallholders party had thus been nullified" was an "unfounded fiction."

### Daily Thaw of Glacier Cause Of Arctic Flood

MOSCOW, June 15.—(AP)—Young Russian scientists, puzzled by reports of Arctic rivers which flooded villages by day and receded by night, traveled to the coldest inhabited place in the world and discovered a huge new glacier and mountain range, soviet scientists said today. They called the glacier "one of the largest in the world."

Lev Berman, one of the scientists in the expedition, said the group penetrated where no human being ever had before they found a huge blue glacier was the cause of the trouble.

He said the temperatures in the region were 70 to 80 degrees below zero fahrenheit in winter but that the days in summer sometimes were quite hot.

Reaching the center of the glacier in mid-summer, Berman said, the scientists found the ice suddenly melting and noted that the rivers began to swirl. The group was suddenly marooned on the ice. But as nightfall approached, the temperature dropped suddenly. The rivers froze rapidly and the party walked to safety bringing with them the secret of the floods.

### Police Recruit Problem Nil

The state police department is experiencing no difficulty in recruiting 75 new officers, made possible under appropriations of the 1947 legislature, H. G. Mason, superintendent, declared here Saturday.

"We are receiving more applications for these positions than we had expected," Mason said, "with ex-servicemen predominating."

A school for the new officers will start at the Klamath Falls vocational center about July 15 under the direction of veteran state police department employees.

Under appropriation of the last legislature, aggregating \$1,000,000 of state highway funds annually, will be used almost exclusively for patrol activities and purchase of patrol equipment. Some other funds probably will be expended in two-way radio equipment and expanding the present one way radio service.

### Big 3 A-Control Meet Suggested

LONDON, June 15.—(AP)—The new commonwealth society, which is headed by Winston Churchill, announced tonight it has asked Prime Minister Attlee to arrange an early meeting of President Truman, Prime Minister Stalin and himself to work out a plan for atomic controls.

The society, of which Attlee himself also is a leader, is a non-partisan organization set up to several years ago for the purpose of studying wars and campaigns to prevent them.

### Barker Nominated At AFL Convention

H. E. Barker, executive secretary of the Salem Trades and Labor council, was nominated for one of two vice president positions in the state American Federation of Labor's annual convention at Bend Friday night, the Associated Press reports. J. D. McDonald, Portland, was the only nominee for the presidency.

Ed J. A. Boehring is an unopposed nominee for executive board membership from the Salem district.

### Ground School Required With GI Flight Courses

The state aeronautics board at a meeting here Friday announced that through agreements with the veterans administration, civil aeronautics authority and other agencies, all flight schools giving training to veterans will be required to conduct classroom ground schools in connection with flight training.

### Marian Lowry Fischer To Head U. of O. Group

EUGENE, Ore., June 14.—(AP)—Marian Lowry Fischer, Salem newspaperwoman, was named president of the State Association of University of Oregon at their annual breakfast here today.

### DAY ELECTS SALEM WOMEN

The auxiliary of the Oregon department, Disabled American Veterans, in its annual convention at Medford Saturday elected Katie Johns of Salem junior vice-commander and chose Josephine Osterlander, also of Salem, treasurer. Alice Tebolt of Newport was elected commander.

### PAYS FOR METER DAMAGE

Police Saturday night arrested a 16-year-old boy, who paid \$8 bail for his release on a charge of destruction of city property after he allegedly damaged a parking meter. Arresting policemen said that he was driving a car and pushed another vehicle over the curb and it struck a parking meter, damaging it.

### Baldock to Ask Senate for Funds

State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock will leave here today for Washington, D. C., where he will appear before a senate appropriations committee in the hope of obtaining increased appropriations for construction of forest roads in the states.

Under the house program Oregon would receive only \$700,000 for forest road construction during the next fiscal year as against \$10,000,000 required to cope with the state highway construction program covering the next three years.

### Truman Denounces Balkan Governments

WASHINGTON, June 14.—(AP)—President Truman denounced the communist governments of Hungary, Romania and Bulgaria today as regimes which oppress their people. And by contrast, he said that Americans stand beside Italy, which has a non-communist government.

The president issued the two statements as he signed the final ratification of the peace treaties with Italy and the three Balkan countries following the senate's approval.

### Cabell Named to Board Of Higher Education

Appointment of Henry F. Cabell, Portland, as a member of the state board of higher education to succeed Aubrey R. Watzek, who resigned recently, was announced by Governor Earl Snell here Saturday. The appointment is for a term ending in 1954.

### Buried Treasure Found in Cellar

DUBUQUE, Ia., June 14.—(AP)—Discovery of a buried treasure of gold and silver coins, some of them minted 125 years ago, was unfolded here today.

John Berens of Dubuque, who unearthed the treasure last week while enlarging the cellar in an old house he bought here, said the total face value of the coins was "in the neighborhood of \$9,000." He declined to disclose the exact amount.

### Inquiry Board In Palestine

JERUSALEM, June 14.—(AP)—The first members of the United Nations special commission on Palestine arrived today amid rising speculation that its ultimate recommendations may bring partition but not peace to the Holy Land.

Justice Emil Sandstrom of Sweden, commission chairman, said upon his arrival at Lydda airfield that the group will tour Palestine prior to opening the inquiry "in order to acquaint ourselves with the country." The commission will hold a plenary session on Monday, then adjourn for the tour.

### INJURED IN FIGHT

Thomas Shaw, resident of the Bligh hotel, was treated by first aid men and taken to Salem Deaconess hospital at about 11:45 p. m. Saturday after he was engaged in a fight, police report. He was treated for superficial head injuries and released by the hospital.

### Midwest Girds Against Flood

OTTUMWA, Ia., June 14.—(AP)—The flood-swollen Des Moines river increased its rate of rise here today and relief officials in this city of 32,000 countered with a stepped-up tempo of advance preparations designed to hold the damage below the extent of last weekend's disaster.

The river started to rise here at the rate of a half foot an hour. The weather bureau in Des Moines said an expected crest of 20 to 20.5 feet was due here at noon tomorrow. The historical peak reached in last week's flood, when some 10,000 inhabitants were driven from their homes and businesses, was 20.24.

### Red-Front List Contains Many Famous Names

WASHINGTON, June 14.—(AP)—The house committee on un-American activities hung a red tag tonight on the southern conference for human welfare as "perhaps the most deviously camouflaged communist front organization."

In an official report to the house, the committee linked with the conference in various capacities such well known names as Henry A. Wallace, Melvyn Douglas, Mrs. Marshall Field, Harold L. Ickes, Joseph E. Davies, Dorothy Parker and Paul Robeson.

The report says some "well-intentioned persons were misled into joining" the organization early in its history and many, but not these, have since repudiated it.
