

Wallace Urges Truman-Stalin Peace Meeting

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—Henry A. Wallace called on President Truman tonight to invite Premier Stalin to meet with him in Berlin as a "first step" to guarantee world peace.

"We must be practical," said the chief critic of the Truman foreign policy. "The time has come to substitute a 'get practical' policy for the Dulles-Vandenberg 'get tough' policy."

The former vice president and cabinet officer who is now editing the New Republic made his remarks in a speech delivered at the government-owned Watergate amphitheatre. Efforts by the American Anti-Communist association to get a court order barring him from the amphitheatre were dismissed by Federal Court Judge James M. Proctor, who said: "These matters do not fall within the judicial realm."

In his address Wallace:

1. Declared "there will be a new party, even if it has no chance of election success in 1948" if both parties "insist on pursuing the present suicidal course toward war and depression." He did not say he would lead such a party.
2. Urged that the United States propose a "complete ban" on international traffic in weapons of war.
3. Suggested the administration and democratic party lead a campaign to nationalize domestic munitions industries.
4. Called on the president to exercise "vigilance" in behalf of programs on housing, health, education and other legislation.

He said the Berlin conference should be called "for the avowed and announced purpose of drawing up an agreement which will cover all the points at issue between the United States and the Soviet Union."

County Districts Vote on Budgets And Directors for School Boards

Growth of Marion county and its school needs was reflected in many of the school district annual meetings Monday night, when voters passed on budget matters, expansions and directorships.

Prime example of district growth showed in Keizer's budget of \$81,672, which is \$38,112 more than last year's budget. The new budget was approved with only two dissenting votes last night, to provide three additional teachers, raises in all teacher salaries, purchase of two buses and payment for three acres of land for a proposed new school building.

At Keizer's election, Ralph Sipprell defeated William Woelke for the directorship from which Herman Rehffuss is retiring. Rehffuss was unopposed for director for zone 2 on the new rural school board. (Other zone 2 votes below.)

Zone 1 Districts
Woodburn, June 16.—Roy P. Kuns was named director of Woodburn school district tonight, receiving 63 out of the 73 votes cast.

Woodburn voters cast only 51 votes for rural school directors, many voters perhaps realizing that Woodburn district was within sight of class one rating when it will be outside the bounds of a rural district. However for selection of the first Marion rural board it had a vote and divided those 51 votes among the four candidates.

Sylvester Smith, St. Paul banker, received the largest vote, 18; John Rasmussen, 13; Ernest Andres, 11; and Albert Kowash, Belle Passi, 9.

Belle Passi, June 16.—Albert Kowash received 44 votes for rural school board and Sylvester Smith of St. Paul was second with seven; Andres, 5; and Rasmussen, 1.

St. Paul, June 16.—Sylvester Smith, local banker, received all of St. Paul's school district vote here tonight at the annual meeting. He was given 64 votes for director on the rural school board for zone 1.

Zone 2 Districts
BETHEL (Marion county), June 16.—A. C. Spranger tonight was re-elected to Bethel school board to succeed himself and Mrs. Spranger will again be school

clerk. Herman Rehffuss was approved unanimously for the rural school board.

The budget of \$1,912.89 which is \$1,922.89 in excess of the six per cent limitation, was approved. Increased teachers' salaries, cost of texts and fuel were said to be responsible for the greatly increased outgo.

FRUITLAND, June 16—Fruitland's school budget of \$4,000, which is \$500 in excess of the 6 per cent limitation, was voted down 20 to 25 here tonight. Chief objection voiced by persons at the annual school meeting was that it was too high. Arnold Aase-rud was elected to the three-year term of the school board to succeed M. Klampe.

E. L. Scott will be chairman again next year. Mrs. C. Miller is the third member of the school board.

HAYESVILLE, June 16—John Versteeg was elected school director for the three-year term to succeed W. J. Jarns. Herman Rehffuss was approved for rural school director and the budget approved. The meeting was unusually large with 43 votes cast. Heated discussion on heating problems of the four-room school still heated with single stories in each classroom was the reason for the larger attendance, those present said.

CENTRAL HOWELL, June 16—Perle Bye was elected to the three year term on the Central Howell school board and the budget was approved at the meeting here tonight. Herman Rehffuss was unopposed for rural school board member in zone 2.

Zone 3 Districts
ROBERTS, June 16—Herbert Miller tonight was elected a member of the Roberts district school board at one of the most heavily attended annual meetings ever held here. The budget was voted in with 16 yes votes and no opposition.

The voters favored Eugene Finley for member of the rural school board, giving him 17 votes to 2 for Margaret Riches. Karl Wipper, unopposed for the five-year term in zone 2 for the non-high school board, received 16 votes and Leonard Zilke, one written-in vote.

Zone 4 Districts
MT. ANGEL, June 16—Mt. Angel voted tonight for Fred Schwab, for rural school board, zone 4, and for John Plas, for the non high school board, zone 4. The vote for Schwab was 224, to one vote for William Tate, his only opponent. Plas received 215 votes to eight cast for Dolph Heater, second candidate for the non-high school position.

The budget of \$12,436.40 was approved and Joe Wavra was re-elected to the district school board.

HAZEL DELL, June 16—Seven voters attended the annual school meeting here and cast their ballots for W. M. Tate for rural school board member, zone 4; and for Dolph Heater for the vacancy on the non-high school board.

UNION HILL, June 16—Mrs. Floyd Fox was elected for the three-year term on the Union Hill consolidated district tonight. Mrs. Fox was named to the board for the short term following consolidation of Union Hill with several other districts several months ago.

The budget of \$18,330 was approved. Vote on the rural school board, zone 4, was: W. M. Tate, 65 and Schwab, 20; for the non-high school board position in zone

4, the vote was Dolph Heater 71, John Plas, 9.

Zone 5 Districts

AUMSVILLE, June 16—Aumsville school districts elected an entire new school board here tonight, after two holdover members resigned, to make way for members from adjoining districts recently consolidated with Aumsville.

Fred Bates of Witzel district was elected for the three-year term to take the place of Lee Sutton whose term expired. Charles Wright of Aumsville was elected for the one-year term to take the place of Harvey Carlson, resigned. Henry Tate of Rocky Point was elected for the two-year term, succeeding Roy Wilcox who resigned.

The budget was approved by a heavy vote and purchase of land for a playground for the grade school was approved by 47 votes. Walter H. Bell was given 37 votes for the rural school board, zone 5, and George Bradley for the non-high school board position, in zone 5.

STAYTON, June 16—The school district budget was accepted, Lawrence Smith was elected for the three-year term on the school board and Walter Bell was approved for rural school director at the annual school meeting here tonight.

Polk County

LINCOLN, June 16—Leslie Stewart was choice of voters here for the position on the Polk rural school board, zone 1, while Ammon Grice's name was written in for zone 1 position on the non-union high school board. Grice was the retiring member but was not a candidate to succeed himself.

J. R. Meisner was elected member of the Lincoln school board for the three-year term, defeating Arthur Yungen, 15 to 11. The 1947-48 budget was approved by a vote of 18 to one.

Guests Routed In Hotel Fire

PORTLAND, Ore., June 16—(AP)—More than 200 guests of the Norta hotel in midtown Portland were evacuated from their rooms in their night clothes late tonight while firemen extinguished a small fire in a light well.

The fire department reported damage was slight and the guests were returned to their rooms.

Road Crashes Take 6 Lives In Weekend

Highway crashes claimed six Oregon lives over the weekend, the worst — in Portland — killing two persons and injuring five others.

The dead in the Portland collision were Carl Bert Borg, 40, and Howard Forsyth, 38.

An automobile that plunged off the Butte creek road in Clackamas county Sunday killed Mrs. Viola Stricklin, 75, of the Yoder district. Her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Guy L. Stricklin, was injured seriously.

Another car went into a ditch near Florence, fatally injuring Mrs. Cassie Smith, 57, Mapleton hotel cafe operator.

A motorcyclist, Richard Bowden, 23, Alpha, Wash., logger, was killed in a crash off the Columbia river highway near Deer Island.

A three-way collision in Portland Saturday killed Raymond L. Turley, 39, Portland.

3 Jews Sentenced To Death; Arabs Staging Strike

JERUSALEM, June 16—(AP)—A British military court sentenced three young Jews to death for terrorism today as the United Nations commission on Palestine began its task of finding a formula for bringing peace to the Holy Land.

The Jewish underground organization Irgun Zvai Leumi promptly appealed to the commission to intercede with the British on behalf of the condemned men. The action of the military court and a peaceful general strike by 1,500,000 Arabs to underscore the decision of the Palestine Arab committee to boycott the 11-nation commission took the spotlight away from its opening session.

The court sentenced the Jews on charges they took part in the daring prison break at Acre on May 4.

Shotgun Wound Causes Loss of Woman's Hand

Hazel Gardner, 44, of Independence, was in Salem General hospital early this morning with a 50-50 chance to live, the attending physician, Dr. Clifford Fraitzke said.

The woman was taken to the hospital after a shotgun wound necessitated amputation of her left hand, above the wrist, said state police, who said they were investigating the possibility that the wound may have been self-inflicted.

Tiniest of Quads Dies; Others Well

MILES CITY, Mont., June 16—(AP)—Tiny Donna Mae Randash, smallest of the Handshaws quadruplets, died here just before midnight last night, 65 hours after she was born last Saturday morning.

Store Plans New Building

Workmen Monday began clearing the path for construction of a Firestone store building in the 25 feet wide, 125 feet deep lot adjacent to the Model market in the 200 block of North High street. The late Dr. S. C. Stone's residence formerly stood on this area.

Now owned by Attorney George Rhoden, the property will be leased to J. P. Lucy, formerly manager of the Longview, Wash. Firestone store, who will move here this week with his wife and 9-year-old son, Rhoden said.

C. A. Lantz, local contractor, will construct the building, utilizing the walls of the buildings on either side.

Rhoden expects work to be completed by August 1, when Lucy will begin store operation for sales of hardware, appliances, tires and auto accessories.

Crews Begin Widening of 12th Street

City Engineer J. H. Davis' workmen Monday followed last week's surveys to South 12th street, from Mission to Bellevue street, and began installation of new curbing.

Park will be allowed on only one side of that section of the street at a time, while the engineer's men work on the other side, Davis said, however, that two-way traffic would be continued at all times.

Widening of the entire three blocks will be completed in about a month, after which operations will begin to similarly widen High street from Chemeketa to Ferry street.

After curbing is in, Warren Northwest, Inc., contractors, will lay the asphalt pavement.
