

County Districts Vote on Budgets And Directors for School Boards

Zone 1
GERVAIS, June 17 — Bert Knowles was re-elected member of the district board, defeating Frances Leonhardt, 34 to 17. The budget of \$13,680 was approved.

HUBBARD, June 17 — Marvin Barrett was elected school director for the three-year term at the annual school meeting Monday

night. John Rasmussen received 13 votes for the position in zone 1 on the rural school board. Ernest Andrews received 2 votes as did Berle Cochran whose name was written in; Albert Kowash and Sylvester Smith received no votes.

AURORA, June 17 — Albert Kowash received nine votes in Aurora school district for zone 1 position on the rural school board for Marion county and John Rasmussen, 2 votes.

Donald Garrett was re-elected for a three-year term as director, hot lunches were approved for the schools and the janitors' salary was raised to \$100 a month. The budget of \$9541.51 was approved. Other members of the local board are Percy Wills, and Eugene Cole who will be chairman this coming year.

Zone 2
LABSSH CENTER, June 17 — Henry Girod was re-elected director for the three-year term and the budget was approved. It provides \$2100 for a nine months teachers salary, \$110 a month for janitor for nine months. Herman Rehfuess was approved for the rural school board member in zone 2.

Zone 3
TURNER, June 17 — Louis Hennies was elected school director for the three-year term and the budget of \$42,903.24 of which \$8,447.48 was outside the 6 per cent limitation was approved. Last year's budget was approximately \$29,000, the increase being represented in three additional teachers, increased salaries, retirement fund, and some needed school improvements.

Margaret Riches, clerk of the Turner district, and candidate for position on the rural school board was given 18 votes to 2 for Eugene Finley, Sunnyside fox breeder, second candidate.

JEFFERSON, June 17 — Only seven persons were out for the annual school meeting Monday night. They approved the budget of \$9,084, in excess of the 6 per cent limitation. All seven votes were cast for Eugene Finley for the zone 3 position on the rural school board.

G. A. Robison was elected to the three-year term as director and Ed Ricks to the two-year term.

SUNNYSIDE, June 17 — Ed Drager was re-elected school di-

rector here Monday night at the annual meeting, defeating W. H. Koelman, 26 to 10. The budget of \$11,864.00 was voted upon item by item and approved with the exception of an item of \$3,500 for the purchase of a new school bus. The previous year's budget was for \$5,884.25. The budget as approved included \$1,200.00 for transportation of elementary school pupils and \$900 for high school transportation. Previously parents paid \$25 for high school transportation and the district \$15 each. Now the districts will assume full cost responsibility. Pupils are taken to Salem high school.

Sunnyside's 36 votes as cast for rural school director, zone 3, were not counted but turned over in the locked ballot box to the secretary of the Marion county boundary board, Agnes C. Booth.

CLOVERDALE, June 17 — Albert Hennies was elected for a three-year term as school director at the annual meeting Monday night. Other members are John Peterson and Sam Drager. Harold Nelson is clerk. Margaret Riches of Turner received eight of the 14 votes cast for rural school board member, zone 3. Finley of Sunnyside received the other six. Karl B. Wipper of Cloverdale was approved for the five-year term on the non-high school board.

Polk County
SPRING VALLEY, June 17 — Peter Wilwert was elected to the three-year term on the zone 1 district school board and the \$4,523 budget was adopted unanimously. Ammon Grice was favored to succeed himself on the non-high school board in zone 1 and Leslie Stewart was elected to the zone 1 position on the rural school board.
