Suggestions for the purchase of the farm laborers' housing project at Salem airport will be considered by directors of Salem Chamber of Commerce at their monthly meeting at 8 o'clock tonight in the chamber offices.

Salem Agricultural Housing, Inc., has requested local business, farm and cannery interests to express their position on possible purchase of the former army barracks recently declared government surplus.

Various growers' groups will consider the matter separately. It was decided at a Monday night meeting of the Marion county farm labor council.

Navy Acquits Comdr. Little

WASHINGTON, June 17—(AP)—The navy announced today that Lt. Comdr. Edward N. Little has been acquitted of charges of "maltreatment" of fellow Americans in a Japanese prison camp where he was senior officer.

Beyond saying that Little was acquitted of all three charges against him, the navy said nothing. The court martial has been meeting secret for four months.

The navy identified the main allegations against Little as: Maltreatment of a person subject to his orders.

Conduct to the prejudice of order and discipline.

Conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman.

Board to Buy 6 School Buses

A call for bids for six new 53-passenger school buses, desired for next school year, was authorized Tuesday night by the Salem school board.

Results of Monday's district election were ratified and the 1947-48 budget given final approval.

Canvass of the ballots disclosed no change from the results listed Monday: Mrs. David Wright, 717 votes for the uncontested directorship; Edward Majek 560, Robert M. Evenden 281 and John Dasch 113 for the three-year term, plus a few write-in votes for each position.

The budget is for \$1,633,814, and the tax levy, including bond requirements in three portions of the district, \$762,086.50. The portion of the tax levy in excess of the 6 per cent limitation, \$273,350, was approved by the electorate by 556-225.

Frederick Ehmann Dies; Services in Portland Friday

Frederick Ehmann, 79, who had moved to Salem from Chicago last October after his retirement, died Tuesday. His residence was at 374 N. Winter St. He was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal church.

Survivors are the widow, Louise Ehmann of Salem; daughters Helen Martha Chambers and Ethel Mary Gore of Portland and Dorothea S. Ehmann of Oldfield; son, Leslie F. Ehmann of Otsville, Mich.

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Military Unification Tops Legislative List

WASHINGTON, June 17—(AP)—Republican leaders today put the armed services unification bill at the top of legislation they hope to cram through congress before a July 26 adjournment.

Chairman Taft (Ohio) said both houses probably will pass a bill, urged by President Truman, to put the house speaker next in line for the presidency when there is no vice president.

Wreckers to Claim Mansion

The old Gideon Stoltz mansion, one of Salem's last downtown houses, will succumb to three wrecking crews that begin work this morning on razing the 18-room structure at 575 Court st.

A parking lot will be established there by Standard Stations, Inc., to be operated in connection with the Standard Oil station adjacent, on the corner of Court and Church streets.

Standard acquired the 2 1/4-story house from Mrs. Elizabeth Colvas, Carmel, Calif., the former Mrs. Richard Stoltz. For the last four years the place was operated as a rooming house by Mrs. Lena Spaulding.

Mrs. Spaulding, now temporarily located at 423 N. Winter st., said all but two of the 18 roomers who have been living in the Court street house have found new living quarters.

Indian Teachers to Hold Convention at Chemawa School

Chemawa Indian school, still facing closure because of the pending reduced interior department federal budget, is nevertheless preparing for the summer educational conference which will bring several hundred Indian service educators here.

Homer H. Howard has arrived from the Chicago Indian office to direct the conference, June 30 through July 25, and other staff members from Indian offices and reservations have begun arriving. Already here are Mrs. Bertha Ellinger of Portland, Oleta Mary of Sacaton, Ariz., and Mrs. Hildegard Thompson of Chicago.

Superintendent M. W. Evans of Chemawa is business manager for the summer school session. Only interruption in plans occasioned by the budget cuts has been cancellation of the Alaskan Indian leaders' separate school which was to have begun this week.
