

Strike Idles 20 Mid-Valley Truck Drivers

Hope was expressed Thursday by local labor officials that a strike which has idled 20 beer truck drivers in Salem, Albany and Corvallis may be ended within several days.

All beer distributors in the three cities, except three in Salem, are affected by the strike. Ward Graham, secretary-treasurer of the teamsters union, local 324, said Thursday. The drivers walked out Tuesday following a strike vote, Graham said.

Ten Salem drivers struck at the Wadhams Distributing company, Davis distributing firm and the McDonald Candy company. Two other beer distributors, Gideon Stolz and Chappel-Marshall, negotiated with their drivers and averted a strike. Sicks distributors, the only other local distributor here, was not affected in any way, Graham said.

In Corvallis the only two beer distributing companies are affected. They are Meadowlark Creamery and Siskum distributing company. Albany's two distributors, Cascade and McDonald Candy company, are tied up. Both cities' drivers are members of the Salem teamsters' union.

The drivers are asking a weekly wage of \$62.50, in contrast to the present \$56.50, and are seeking two weeks' vacation after three years' employment with a firm. At present their two weeks' vacation comes after five years' employment, Graham said.

Several negotiation meetings preceded the strike vote, Graham said. Employers are represented in the Oregon Beer Distributors' association with headquarters in Portland. Graham indicated that negotiations may be resumed soon.

Former Owner Of Salem Taxi Company Dies

Robert Arthur Clark, 69, former operator of the Salem (yellow) Taxi company, died in a Eugene hospital Thursday after a major operation Tuesday. He had been ill for four years.

Funeral services will be at 10 o'clock Monday morning in the Mission street United Brethren church with the Rev. Albert Henderson officiating and interment at Union cemetery, Philomath, under direction of the Howell-Edwards chapel.

Clark was born at Waco, Tex., Dec. 29, 1877, and came to Oregon 55 years ago. With Troy Wood, he purchased the Salem Taxi company in 1923. His son, Robert Lynn Clark, was a partner with his father until buying the operation last year. The firm has 10 taxicabs.

Surviving are his wife, Orpha Nina Clark of Salem; two sons, Gordon L. Clark of Empire, Ore., and Robert Lynn Clark of Salem; two daughters, Margaret Watkins of Salem and Katherine Beal of Newport; eight grandchildren; three sisters, Florence Blackley of Crescent City, Calif., and Bessie Peterson and Laura Robin, both of Eugene and a brother, Don Clark of San Francisco.

Bevin Lashes Russian Policy

LONDON, June 19.—(P)—British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin served notice on Russia tonight that the western world never has and never will stand for suppression of liberty.

"If there is to be a conflict between ideologies I shall regret it, but if it is forced upon us we must face it," Bevin told the house of commons. Then he added:

"I don't believe the western world, in the long run, will be the sufferers, if there is a conflict, because I am convinced, although you cannot organize it—you cannot sit down in committee and discuss tactics—but I have seen so many conflicts and so many dictators attempt to suppress liberty in the world. In the end it has been the dictators who have failed."

Methodists Plan to Add New District

PORTLAND, June 19.—(P)—A plan to divide Oregon Methodist churches into four districts instead of the traditional three held the approval of the denomination's convention here today.

Each district would have 35 to 45 churches instead of the 60 the districts now have. The plan will mean the appointment of an additional district superintendent.

Treasurer Ernest Purvance, Coquille, reported total church funds collected this year were slightly more than a million dollars. He also said \$69,000 of a proposed \$210,000 pension fund for retired ministers had been raised. The additional money is to be raised this year.

President G. Herbert Smith of Willamette university reported on the new men's dormitory on the Willamette campus.

Jury Chosen in Overell Case

SANTA ANA, Calif., June 19.—(P)—After 14 days of plodding examination, a jury of six men and six women was selected today to try Louise Overell, 18, and George (Bud) Collum, 21, her fiancé, on charges of murdering her parents, Financier and Mrs. Walter E. Overell.

A jury satisfactory to prosecution and defense was seated at 2:55 p. m. (Pacific standard time) after 530 veniremen had been summoned.

The tedious task of jury selection began May 26. The huge panel of prospective jurors, which must have set a record for Orange county jurisprudence, was necessitated by repeated excuses, chiefly on grounds of preconceived opinion, prejudice, pressure of business, health, or objection to the death penalty.

Reds Cling to A-Control Veto

LAKE SUCCESS, June 19.—(P)—Andrei A. Gromyko, soviet deputy foreign minister, asserted today that Russia would never agree to any atomic control plan in which the big powers had no authority to veto the punishment of violators.

The soviet delegate made his declaration at a closed session of the United Nations atomic energy commission's working committee as it sought unsuccessfully to resolve the differences between the United States and Russia on this major issue.

This was the second consecutive day that Gromyko had jarred the U. N. with blunt statements on major soviet policy. Yesterday he told the commission for conventional armaments that its approval of a U. S. plan of work might lead to the "collapse" of the entire arms reduction program.

Mississippi Continues Rise, Record Near

QUINCY, Ill., June 19.—(P)—Lowland residents began moving out south of here tonight as the Mississippi river continued to rise steadily with record crests predicted for the end of the week.

All persons were ordered out of a 120,000-acre district protected by the Sny levee in Pike county, Ill., which was water-soaked by a weak and by last week's high waters. This included the village of Hull, with a population of about 600.

The U. S. coast guard and an air rescue detachment of Scott Field, Ill., had several planes patrolling the threatened area between Quincy trying to spot any persons marooned by the high waters.

As the flood waters of the Iowa river poured into the Mississippi at their confluence near Oakville, Ia., leaving more than 100,000 acres of bottomland under water in the eastern section of the state, the little town of Alexandria, Mo., remained inundated. It was flooded last week by a levee break and its residents had not returned.

Dam vs Fish Hearing Set

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19.—(P)—A multi-million dollar decision affecting the future of the entire Pacific Northwest will be at stake at a public hearing in Walla Walla, Wash., June 25.

The decision would place the interior department on record as ready to sacrifice, if necessary, the great Columbia river salmon run in favor of a gigantic dam construction program. The only concession to the fishing industry would be another decade of life for the salmon while attempts are made to transplant the fish to the lower Columbia tributaries.

The decision, which exists on paper now as a "preliminary recommendation" by the department, in effect would establish a ten-year moratorium on dam construction on the lower Columbia and Snake rivers and—for the first time—set up a master schedule for irrigation and power development in the region.

General Paints Grim Picture of A-War Strategy in Northwest

WALLA WALLA, June 19.—(P)—A military leader's dramatic but grim prediction of radio activity running rampant along the Columbia river in any future war was presented today to the state Veterans of Foreign Wars convention.

Brig. Gen. E. M. Llewellyn, state adjutant general, described the potential wartime havoc, from a broken Grand Coulee dam, in transposing himself to the imaginary position of commanding officer for a dictator with ambitions of world conquest.

He said Washington state would be a primary goal because of its hydro electric and atomic power resources and its favorable location as a landing and holding base. "If I were an enemy," he said, "I would proceed first by infiltration with 'tin soldier' propaganda against the national guardsmen and by preaching against preparedness."

With today's long range airplanes, I would hit every production center in the United States at the same time with atomic bombs," he continued. "I'd blow Grand Coulee dam apart with an atomic bomb behind it—as only an atomic bomb could do."

"The resulting flood would wash away Wenatchee, Richland, Bonneville, Longview and Kelso. The flood waters would be radio-active. The flood would leave radio-activity for a quarter of a mile on each bank of the river. It would make re-bridging of the river impossible."

"Then I would drop a bomb on Seattle just for the hell of it. It would probably kill close to half a million people. Other thousands would rush to the hills. Many would be burned by radio-activity."

"Tacoma's populace also would flee to the hills. The fleeing hordes would bring confusion and chaos on the roads which would be so important to military movements at such a time."

General Llewellyn pleaded with the VFW to work for a full strength national guard in the state, which he said would be of prime value in case of any attack.

British May Ban Hereditary House of Lords

LONDON, June 19.—(P)—Arthur Bax, press secretary of the labor party, said today the British government was thinking seriously of ways to junk the house of lords as a hereditary law making body.

"Discussions are obviously taking place in government circles," he said in comment on a Daily Express story which said the upper house would be "clipped because of a series of government defeats over the transport bill," a major piece of socialistic legislation for nationalizing railroads and distance truckers.

The Express said the labor gov-

ernment was considering replacing the present house of lords with a new chamber of life peers, whose titles would not be hereditary.
