

### Circuit Court Jury Panel for July Drawn

Drawing of a jury panel for the July term of the Marion county circuit court was made Friday, coincident with announcement by Judge E. M. Page of a change in scheduling of cases, expected to result in reduced jury costs.

Beginning in July, all cases for a week are to be placed on the calendar for Tuesday, following motion day on Monday. This so far means nine cases on July 8 and six on July 15.

Page said this method should obviate the need for jurors to appear only to learn that the scheduled action has been settled at the last minute.

The panel will be notified each day as to need for their services the following day. The saving results from the fact that, effective July 5 jurors' pay is raised from \$3 to \$5 per day, as approved by the 1947 state legislative session.

### Crose Defends Vet Benefits at Realty Lunch

Urging his audience to analyze fairly the picture in regard to veterans' benefits, Al Crose, Oregon veterans' affairs loan officer, described his work to the Salem Board of Realtors, meeting Friday noon at the Marion hotel.

Crose said some of the benefits are gratuities but that most are things earned by service, such as compensation and hospitalization—"which are real costs of war." He urged that ex-service men not be condemned as "taking advantage" of such laws as unemployment compensation since, he said, things like that happened before the veterans were included in the picture.

Action by the 1947 legislative session increased the amount which the state may loan on veterans' homes from \$3000 to \$6000. This, said Crose, is limited to 75 per cent of the appraised value. It cannot be advanced for construction purposes but can be committed before the dwelling is ready for occupancy. The interest rate is 4 per cent, with a maximum payment time of 20 years. To be eligible the veteran must have entered the service from Oregon and the property must be in the state.
