Red Cross to Supply Free Blood Plasma

The proposal to have the American Red Cross supply blood and its derivatives, free of charge to all in need of it, was approved at the national convention of the Red Cross in Cleveland last week, Susan Faherty, executive manager of Marion county chapter, reported Friday on her return to Salem.

Mechanics of distributing the needed blood and of setting up the program in all chapters will be announced later, the newly created board of governors of the national Red Cross to decide on the time the new program is to go into effect.

City Landing Fees For UAL Raised

United Airlines landing fees paid to the city are now \$180 per month for four airports daily. City Recorder Alfred Mundt said Friday. The increase from the former \$140 fee will be retroactive to April 1, this year.

The city council is legislating to make the change, as suggested by the airline, to increase the rates to standard. Until last October, two daily stops were made here by UAL and rates were \$90 monthly. A \$140 fee has been assessed by the city since that time. Under the present rate schedule, flights more than four daily will cost \$25 each, over the basic \$180 for the present four landings and take-offs.
