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**Shredded Wheat People Push Product For All Day Use: Novel Recipes Given**

A cereal company came out recently with an entire booklet devoted to uses for prepared cereals as used for other than breakfast dishes. Shredded wheat plays an important part in the booklet. Some of the suggestions for its use include:

Dipped in egg and milk and fried to make a new version of French toast. Crumbled up in griddle cake batter to give texture and flavor.  
Mixed with ground meat for cabbage rolls. Hollowed out and filled with creamed cauliflower, asparagus or shrimp.  
Used in place of crumbs in meat loaf. Used to replace crumbs in stuffing for veal roast.  
Added to biscuit dough when mixing up a shortcake for strawberries and whipped cream over as a quick dessert.  
And finally:

**PEANUT BUTTER JUMBLES**

1/2 cup shortening

1/2 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup peanut butter  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup sifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
3 Shredded wheat

Cream shortening and sugar, stir in eggs and peanut butter. Add remaining ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Drop by spoonful into cookie sheet, flatten slightly. Bake at 375 degrees for about 10 minutes. Makes about 4 dozen cookies.

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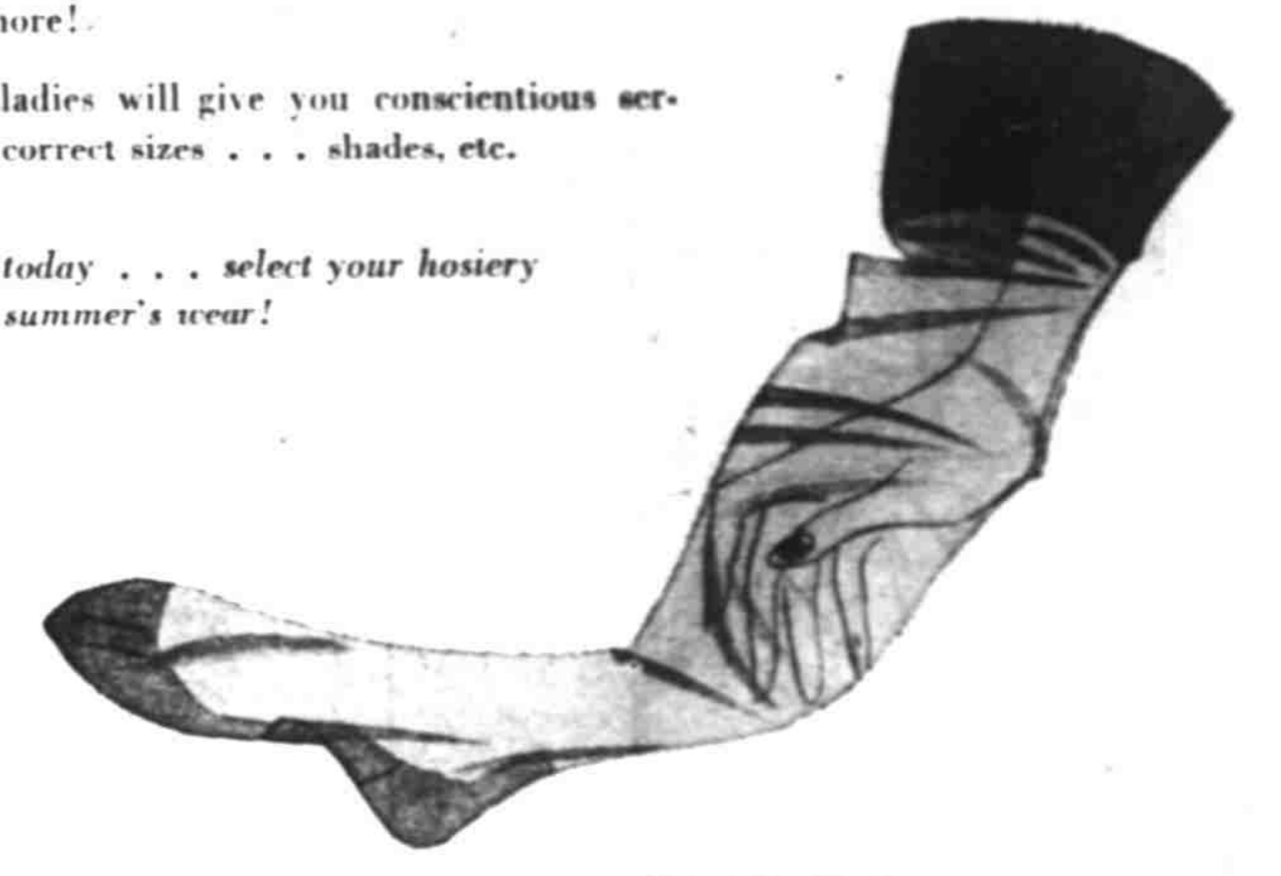
