

Solons Rained Out; A's Next

Cap Series Finishes Even; Jackets Win

VANCOUVER, June 25—(Special)—The rubber game of the Western International league series was rained out here tonight, leaving the set all square at one game each. The washout lost the third-place Solons ground in the loop race as second-place Bremerton and fourth-place Victoria came through with wins in the only circuit contests played tonight. The Brem triumph left the Solons 1 1/2 games behind them, while the Vic climbed within 2 1/2 games of the 3rd place spot.

The Solons next embark by boat for Victoria where they take on the Athletics tomorrow night in the first tilt of a four-game series, winding up with a twin-bill Sunday.

Doyle Dies; 'Sugar' Held

CLEVELAND, June 25—(AP)—Jimmy Doyle, a game little ring campaigner from Los Angeles, fought and lost his last battle today as he succumbed to injuries received in last night's world welterweight championship bout with Ray (Sugar) Robinson. Death came to the 22-year-old Californian just 17 hours after he had been felled by a left hook in the eighth round of a bout he hoped would carry him to the championship.

Coroner Samuel R. Gerber said Robinson would be arraigned immediately on a technical manslaughter charge, and police homicide members ordered the championship not to leave town.

Every effort was made to save Doyle's life. He was operated on last night by Dr. Spencer Braden, noted Cleveland brain specialist, in an effort to relieve a paralysis of the respiratory center.

Seattle Crew Capital As Oar Classic Looms

SEATTLE, June 25—(AP)—Seattle succeeded Poughkeepsie, N.Y., today as the crew capital of the world as the sweep-ups of a dozen collegiate eight-oared shells congregated here for Saturday's second annual Lake Washington regatta.

Cornell, last year's winner and the second place boat at Poughkeepsie last week, was confident but not cocky as it came back to the scene of its triumph. Harvard and Yale, neither of which competed at Poughkeepsie, were first to get their shells off the car and down to the canal. Others of the 12 entrants are California, Columbia, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Pennsylvania, Princeton, Syracuse, Washington and Wisconsin.

Tigers, Bosox Divide Pair

WIMBLEDON, June 25—(AP)—British empire stars collaborated to repel some tennis invaders from the United States today as Australia's Billy Sidwell and England's Tony Mottram ousted Tom Brown of San Francisco and Budge Patty of Los Angeles from the men's doubles, 6-2, 2-6, 7-5, 4-6, 6-4, in the first upset of the Wimbledon championships. The five-set duel filled the center court stands with 14,000 fans and kept the 80-year-old Dowager Queen Mary sitting on the edge of her chair until long after dinner time.

Nowadays when you bring up the old cry, "Murderer's Row," you've got to apply it to the New York Giants rather than their cross-town rivals, the Yankees. Once again Mel Ott's crew put on a wallop display yesterday as the Giants climbed within one game of the 19th Boston Braves via a 9-3 triumph over the Chicago Cubs. Johnny Mize, Willard Marshall and Walker Cooper each contributed homers to the Pele Grounders' attack, Mize being his 19th, the other two hammering their 14th. The Brooklyn Dodgers remained ahead of the Giants in second place and moved within half a game of the Braves with a 6-2 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates and Cincinnati topped the Philadelphia Phils, 9-2.

Little Billy, wearing a white sun-drenched cap, sparked on the match that was the feature of the tournament's third day, otherwise devoted to unevenly doubles matches and a handful of women's singles.

In the American look the Yankee's sensational rookie, Frank Shea, chalked his 9th pitching win against two losses as he held the Cleveland Indians to three hits to beat them, 3-0. A mob of 60,000 was in Yankee Stadium for the tilt. The win gave the Yanks a 2 1/2 game margin in first place over the Boston Red Sox which split with Detroit. The Tigers, behind Hal Newhouse, took the first game, 4-2, but dropped the second, 4-3. Philadelphia Athletics defeated the St. Louis Browns, 4-2.
