## County School Officials Talk Of New Laws

Discussion of the basic school support law and the rural school law by Lester A. Wilcox, state educational department, highlighted Friday's sessions of the annual conference of the Oregon Association of County School Superintendents here.

The basic school support law, under which the public schools will receive approximately \$16,000,000 annually, was approved by the voters at the last general election and machinery for its operation was set up by the 1947 legislature. Wilcox said this law would tend to stabilize school finances, provide higher salaries for teachers and go far toward improving the Oregon public school system.

Reports were received by the conference from their service committees and the regional conference committee. Late Friday afternoon the superintendents were entertained at a tea by Delta Kappa Gamma society, followed by the conference banquet. Dr. C. A. Howard, president of the Oregon College of Education, Monmouth, was the banquet speaker. Laurence C. Moffitt, Josephine county, was toastmaster.

The state association of county school district secretaries, also in session here, centered their discussions largely on problems and practices of their offices. Virtually every section of the state was represented at both conferences. Marion Larson, Tillamook, was elected president of the secretaries' association.

## Carol Dibble Dies; Funeral Rites Monday

Carol Dibble, recently a proofreader for The Oregon Statesman and widely known in Salem news, drama and art circles, died Friday morning at her home, 404 N. Church st., after a long period of poor health and a recent illness of several months. She was 54.

A native of Salem, she attended school in Palo Alto, Calif., and after graduating from high school there assisted her father, the late W. C. Dibble, in his tulip bulb business in Salem.

Later she attended the Cornish school in Seattle and became a teacher of expression in Salem. She was a member of the faculty of Salem Art center during the years it was operated here. She was associated in various capacities with the editorial departments of both the Capital Journal and The Oregon Statesman in Salem.

Surviving are her mother, Mrs. Gertrude Sharpe Dibble, Salem, and an aunt, Nellie M. Dibble, Palo Alto, Calif. Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. John B. Craig at 10:30 a.m. Monday in the W. Rigdon funeral home. Concluding services will be at Belcrest Memorial park.
