

Entire Crew of Airliner Watch 'Flying Disc' Cavort; Picture of 'Saucer' Taken in Seattle

BOISE, Ida., July 4—(AP)—The entire crew of a westbound Boise-to-Seattle United Air Lines plane tonight reported they had seen nine flying discs near the airline's route over Emmett, Idaho.
Capt. E. J. Smith of UAL trip 105 which left Boise at 9:04 p. m., said that his copilot, first officer Ralph Stevens, blinked the transport's landing lights in the belief the discs were other aircraft.
Blinking landing lights during a night flight is a pilot's signal of warning to other aircraft that a plane is flying in the same area.
Smith said it was eight minutes after takeoff from Boise that Stevens and himself saw five discs, flying what appeared to be a "loose formation."
They called Marty Morrow, stewardess, to the cockpit to verify

that they were actually seeing the discs, said Smith, and she agreed they saw them.
Then they saw four more of the discs, three clustered together, and a fourth flying "by itself, way off in the distance."
The plane was flying into the dim twilight sky when the objects were first sighted, Smith told the Idaho Daily Statesman by telephone from Pendleton, where the transport first landed after leaving Boise.
Smith is a veteran of the airlines, and the story he and Stevens told is the first confirmation by experienced airmen of flying discs which have been reported over the northwest for the past two weeks.
Smith and Stevens said that as the landing lights were blinked, they could see no responding lights on the objects.
"The discs were flat and roundish," they said. "They definitely were not aircraft. But they were bigger than aircraft."
Following their first sight of the discs, said Smith and Stevens, it was observed the five objects were apparently climbing on a course approximating that of the airliner. At no time, they said, was there any apparent danger of a collision.

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, July 5—(AP)—Thirty-five "flying discs" were seen within a 20-minute period yesterday afternoon by nearly 60 persons picnicking at Twin Falls park, a scenic area about seven miles east of here.
A party of seven persons saw the discs heading west in a rough "V" formation at approximately 2:50 p. m. (MST). A. E. Mitchell, Goose Creek, Tex., visiting relatives here, said the discs were flying very fast at great altitude.

SEATTLE, July 4—(AP)—A coast guardman said tonight he believed he had taken the first picture of one of the mysterious "flying discs" which have been reported recently in flight about the west.
Yeoman Frank Ryman, coast guard public relations officer, said he took the picture from his home north of Seattle after excited

neighbors told him of sighting it high overhead.
The results of his photographic effort showed as a tiny light spot, about the size of a pinhead, against the dark background of the evening sky.
He said he took the picture when it was directly overhead.
His wife said they watched it for what seemed like close to 10 minutes as it seemed to speed across the sky. She said her impression was of a shiny ball at great height.
Ryman said the object seemed to be close to 10,000 feet high and "it was flashing brilliant silver in the sun," and seemed "about one-tenth the apparent size of a full moon."

He said there was "no noise" from it, "it definitely was not a plane," and it "appeared to be traveling over 500 miles an hour."
Ryman looked at the object through field glasses, he said and it "appeared to be extremely smooth on its surface." He said he at first thought it a silver balloon, but a check on the wind showed it could not have had such speed.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., July 4—(AP)—The coast guard cutter Orion, guided by an army C-47 transport plane, plowed toward a spot 300 miles northeast of here today where wreckage sighted on the sea was believed to be that of a missing C-54 military cargo aircraft.
The C-47, largest of army transports, took over the job of guiding surface craft to the scene when poor visibility and communications difficulties hampered rescue efforts for six crewmen missing with the downed craft.
Army authorities said the wreckage had not been definitely identified as that of the C-54 carrying six men, which disappeared yesterday while flying from Kindley field, Bermuda, to Morrison field, West Palm Beach.

Illinois Town Loses Fight Against River

GRAND TOWER, Ill., July 4 (AP)—Their battle against relentless Mississippi lost, the people of this river town anxiously watched muddy water inching higher into their business district and most of their homes today as the river's crest approached.
A sandbag barrier feverishly erected by the towns 1,000 residents after several days of back-breaking labor, in which even women and children took part, was smashed last night and the river spread over about two-thirds of the town, including all of the business district.
The break came so suddenly that the weary townspeople had no opportunity to repair it. The two big pumps which had been used to dispose of sewage water were washed away.
Mayor Jesse Grammer reported the river had climbed to 40.45 feet this afternoon, the highest stage ever recorded here, and described it as the worst of several floods experienced by the town, which is not protected by a permanent dike.
Should the river rise several more inches the waters would pour over the ground floors of several business establishments, greatly increasing the damage, he said.

U.S. Guarantees Food to Germans

BERLIN, July 4 (AP)—U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson announced today that he had guaranteed sufficient shipments of American food to insure Germans in the British American occupation zones "a reasonable diet" and fulfillment of the current official ration of 1,550 calories a day.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. John F. Logan and Miss Mary Graham, and by two brothers, R. W. Sprague, Seattle, and Charles A. Sprague, Salem. Funeral services will be announced later.

ELKTON, Md., July 4—(AP)—Two young girls died in Union hospital here tonight and a father and sister of the victims were in critical condition with burns suffered in an explosion of skyrockets at a family reunion, Cecil Dodson reported.
The victims were identified by Mr. Dodson as Ann Cameron, 8, and Ruth Anne Holmes, 2. William Cameron, 33, father of Ann, and Cecilia Holmes, 11, sister of Ruth Anne, were in a serious condition.
Dr. Dodson was told that nine persons were on the front porch of Mrs. Holmes' home at Elks Neck, three miles from here, when the fireworks were set off.
