

Gardening Today

A rainy June has brought on a good crop of many things, including, or perhaps of should say, especially weeds. The thought of weeds recalls to my mind R. A. Power's attractive little book "Know Your Weeds."

This paper bound book (I am having mine bound so that I know it will last for some time) provides an easy way of learning how to identify around 100 most common weeds. There is a drawing of each weed and at the close of each description, a very useful paragraph called "Means of Eradication."

While the book was published before 24-D, it does have a short article on chemical eradication, as well as many other methods.

July in the Garden
July is an important month in the garden (I wonder which one isn't?) because so many things are done this month which are of great importance later on. In the rose bed you must spray or dust at regular ten-day intervals. Do not spray or dust when temperature is above 85 degrees. Water beds at weekly intervals but do not fertilize. During the latter part of July, cut back some of the more "stocky" canes about six inches to stimulate new growth for fall bloom. Use an all purpose dust or spray. There are many good ones on the market.

It is time to sow your perennials and your late vegetables for next spring's bloom and next winter's table. Delphiniums should be planted this month. If you haven't already done so, try Pacific Giant strain, acknowledged to be the world's finest delphiniums. Experts will tell you to broadcast the seed over the surface of the thoroughly dampened flat. After this, sift fine soil over the surface to about the thickness of a dime. Press the whole down gently with a board. Water with a fine spray and cover the flat with moistened burlap. As soon as sprouting has begun, remove the burlap, keep in a shaded place. A thin layer of sand over the dampened bed discourages crawling insects such as slugs.

Other perennials which should go into the seed beds now are violas, bleeding heart (there is a lovely new white-flowered one), snapdragons, rudbeckia, foxgloves (ever try the lovely yellow one?), pansies.

be divided immediately after blooming as if divided later they lose much of their growth. The other school of thought holds that the small amount of growth lost is made up for in the controlling of weevil. The last of the eggs have been hatched in late summer and you will not carry the pest to new ground. If they are planted at any time during the summer they must be kept growing by watering. If I have baited properly, I like to divide the older plants right after they have bloomed and the younger plants in late August.

W.G. asks when to trim wisteria, or if it should be left alone. Ans. By all means cut it back somewhat each year. Right now is the best time. All side laterals of new growth should be shortened to a foot or two in length. Main trunks or side branches that are being trained, need not be cut. Wisterias, particularly some varieties can be made to have some bloom on them for almost six months out of the year by proper pruning and watering.

R.L. asks when holly shrub should be set out.
Ans. From September to December is listed as the best time.

Kaiser-Frazer Profit Forecast

DETROIT, July 5—(AP)—Kaiser-Frazer corp. built 12,039 passenger automobiles last month; if its flow of supplies can be maintained without serious interruption it will average 15,000 units a month for the remainder of the year and show a net profit on 1947 operations of from \$8,000,000 to \$10,000,000.

That's the conviction of Edgar F. Kaiser, vice-president and general manager of Kaiser-Frazer corp., expressed in an interview today.

If the production program for the latter half of the year is achieved several thousand hourly-rated workers will share a bonus pool of approximately \$700,000. Under a contract agreement \$5 per car shipped is set aside for distribution among the workers each year.

Purebred Breeder Feels Milk Setup Is Unjust Penalty

The feeling that Linn-Benton County Jersey Cattle show has outgrown a one-day limitation was expressed at the June meeting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Burley Oakley of Albany.

Jerseymen attending, voted to make next year's event a two-day affair, the 4-H and Future Farmers exhibiting on the first day, with first and second place winners to be shown in the open classes on the following day.

This will give the open classes more time for judging, it was pointed out and also enable exhibitors to get home in time to do their chores.

A short discussion was held on the new price setup for milk, and speakers pointed to the fact that 100 pounds of milk at 55 cents has been cut 50 cents while 100 pounds of 4 cents milk has been cut only 4 cents. The feeling was expressed that this an unjust penalty on the purebred breeder who is working for high-test production.

Blackcap Virus Enters Willamette Valley Gardens

Verticillium wilt has been found in numerous blackcap plantings in the Willamette valley this spring, county agents report.

This virus disease causes dwarfing and wilting of new canes. Bluish strips of ribbons of infected tissue may extend up the canes from the ground.

Infection usually takes place through the small roots and then

remains in the soil. Other crops that are common carriers of the same disease are potatoes, tomatoes, egg plant, strawberries and pig weed.

To date no cure for the disease, once it enters the plant, has been found. Some of the practices farmers use to keep the infection controlled are roguing infected plants as soon as they are noticed in the patch, planting only healthy stock from plantings that are free of wilt; rotate crops three or four years between plantings of blackcaps and refrain from planting any of the carrier plants nearby.

Oregon Vets Take Correspondence Courses
Correspondence courses have been selected by nearly 1,250 Oregon World War II veterans for their education under the GI bill according to Wayne Smith, veterans administration training officer in this area. The VA has contracts with about 130 state-approved schools to offer such courses to veterans, including the Oregon system of higher education.

WHEAT HARVEST TO START
PENDLETON, July 5—(AP)—Harvesting of a state wheat crop expected to be about 3,500,000 bushels smaller than last year will move into full swing Monday in the Columbia basin. Cool weather and rain during June have saved the wheat fields from the heavy damage feared during the May drought, but agricultural officials expected the yield still to be below 1946.
