Watch Apricot Supply and Buy Just At Correct Time: Recipes Given

Apricots will be on the market soon, they are making their appearance in small quantities, and the supply should be watched, but indications are that the larger part of the supply will be here next week.

Apricots come and go rather suddenly some years, for the main portion of our supply come from the Yakima valley and the season for shipping is short.

According to department of agriculture recommendations, Tiltons are still top variety for canning and freezing, followed by Royal Blenheims, then Wenatchee and then Moorpark.

Though there's difficulty in finding pineapple in the market these days, it does combine wonderfully with apricots for conserve if it can be found.

Apricot-Pineapple Conserve
5 pounds apricots
1 can crushed pineapple
1 cup nuts
10 cups sugar

Drain pineapple, remove seeds from apricots and cut them up but do not peel them. Let fruit stand in layers with the sugar for an hour. Cook until thick in a rather shallow kettle, adding nuts about 20 minutes before cooking is completed.

To make jam, wash and pit the fruit, and crush it down. Measure and boil 10 minutes, adding a little water if necessary to keep from sticking. Add $\frac{3}{4}$ as much sugar as you have fruit and cook until thick. Bottle and seal.

For canning apricots, halve and pit them but do not peel. (You can if desired, but most cooks like the flavor of the unpeeled fruit best).

Add a medium syrup (1 part

sugar to two of water and boil until sugar dissolves.) Pack hot into the jars and process in boiling water for 15 minutes.

Best way of freezing apricots is this:

FROZEN APRICOTS
Wash, halve and pit fruit. Place in boiling water half a minute to prevent discoloration. Cool, place in a medium syrup and take immediately to the freezer.

Here's another marmalade:
HANNAH'S MARMALADE
5 pounds apricots
10 cups sugar
1 orange
1 lemon

Slice fruit and let stand with sugar. Boil slowly until slightly thickened. It thickens up rather fast.
