There is reason to believe however that several of these countries look longingly to Paris and to the United States. Some confess they want and need machinery and supplies from America, and hope they may be able to get it. But when Stalin frowns they shiver, as well they may in view of their exposure Motion Picture at to a tough and powerful neighbor.

There is however some difference in the situation in these east-European countries and that in the west. They are more agricultural in character, and the state most highly industrialized, Czechoslovakia, has pretty well restored its manufacturing. Poland has coal mines and is furnishing eastern Europe with coal. The peasant countries of Bulgaria, Romania and Yugoslavia should soon provide adequate subsistence for their people. Hungary is probably in the worst shape, with its economic system shot to pieces and its resources impaired by Russian expropriation. Russia itself may have some grain for export this year. At least it ought to be able to get along with raiding the production of occupied states. From the standpoint of relief the standout nations may not suffer acutely by staying away from Paris and the ofter of American aid.

For the longer period however injury may flow both ways. These peasant countries have been suppliers of foodstuffs to the more highly industrialized west and in turn have obtained a large part of their manufactured articles from Germany, France, Italy and England. Will the demarche across Europe end this interchange? Will these countries have to live within Pilgrim Fellowship. If so the standard of living within most of them will remain at very low levels for an indefinite period. And the west too will suffer for lack of grain from the Danube basin.

sprouts of fascism survive the war in Spain, in Argentina, in Italy and Germany and (in disguise) in the United States.

Let the report on fascism be published. The people ought to know how it works the same as for communism. If it contains errors they can be exposed. Suppression always excites suspicion that powerful hands are exerting controls to the damage of truth. The people have quite as much right to know what the fascist threat is as any other; and congress should not discriminate between the twin evils of our time.

Collins to Staff Position

The naming of Lt. Gen. J. Lawton Collins to the position of deputy chief of staff arouses special interest because of the expected retirement of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, present chief, early next year. Speculation naturally arises over whether Collins will then move to the post of chief. Previously the gossip had given that assignment to Gen. Omar Bradley.

Bradley is recognized as a great soldier Some, like Capt. Ralph Ingersoil, give him the lion's share of credit for the victory in France, though others distribute the laurels more widely.

Collins however has a notable record proving he is well equipped for chief of staff if he should be the choice. He served both in the Pacific and European theatres of combat. He commanded the 25th division on Gaudalcanal and New Georgia and led the VIII army corps from Utah beach in Normandy to a junction with the Russians on the Elbe. This corps effected the breakthrough at St. Lo which released the American forces for their great sweep through France, and then captured Cherbourg to provide a port for the allies. It was Collins also who drove a counter-attack on the northern flank of the "bulge" which helped to crush the German effort to push the allies into the sea.

The war department may find the choice of chief of staff difficult because of the abundance of good material available. The country can feel happy with the selection either of Bradley or Collins .
