

Hungary Vote Law to Assure Red Victory

BUDAPEST, July 16 (AP)—A new Hungarian election law, which provides no restrictions on how many times one person may vote, was presented to a parliamentary committee today.

The bill will reach the floor of parliament next week, possibly Monday.

A Hungarian legal expert, who translated and explained the law for American correspondents, said it "will assure the victory of the communist-dominated coalition government" which includes the now thoroughly weakened smallholders party. He said it will "make equally certain" the defeat of opposition parties, principally the outspoken anti-communist szabados (freedom) party led by Dezo Sulyok, who apparently is disqualified as a candidate.

European Nations To Compile Assets

PARIS, July 16 (AP)—France proposed to the European economic conference today that colonial resources of all member nations be included in drawing up the economic balance sheet in a coordinated reconstruction program under the Marshall plan.

Addressing the opening session of the new organization's "cooperation" or steering committee, Herve Alphand of France said the 16 member nations should reckon overseas production of essential materials in compiling their needs and assets.

Governors Avoid Specific Support Of Marshall Plan

SALT LAKE CITY, July 16 (AP)—The governors' conference called tonight for a non-partisan, peace-seeking foreign policy and expressed "faith and confidence" in Secretary of State Marshall.

In a generalized statement on foreign policy, the governors of 44 states avoided any specific endorsement of Marshall's European rehabilitation program.

They adopted, however, a resolution which said:

"To the secretary of state, Hon. George C. Marshall, we express our faith and confidence and our deep appreciation for his inspiring address to the conference."

Senate Passes Credit Controls

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—Legislation continuing consumer credit controls until December 31, with easier terms on some purchases, was passed by the senate today and sent to the house.

The limit on credit, now 15 months, would be increased to 24 months, and no down payment of more than 20 percent could be required by the government. Minimum down payments of 33 1/2 percent now are required for some items such as automobiles, household equipment and radios.

U. S. MAY SELL SHIPS
WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—A prospective sale of 10 passenger cargo ships to Turkey was disclosed today by Secretary of State Marshall as part of the government's program to strengthen the Turkish armed forces against communist pressure.

V-6 Reserve Meet Tonight

A meeting for V-6 naval reservists will be held tonight at 8 o'clock at building 504, Salem airport, to discuss further organizing of the national Elks convention here today.

At a meeting held Wednesday night, Capt. A. D. Ayrault, 15th naval reserve district director, explained to V-3 and V-6 members that the V-3 electronics warfare unit would remain separate but members will be eligible for similar work on pay status with the organized reserve.

Discs Continue to Cavort in Skies Over Salem Area

Leo Brockway, manager of the local Sears Roebuck store's boys department, reported Wednesday afternoon sighting one of the mysterious flying discs cruising over Salem in a southerly direction at about 4,000 feet altitude and at about 350 miles per hour.

Brockway first sighted the disc as he was topping the South Liberty street hill at 1:15 p. m., and stopped his car to better observe the flying object. He said that the disc was flying on a true course and reflected the sun's rays brilliantly, as does a mirror. After flying south the disc made a brisk 30 degree turn and headed in a southeasterly direction. As it made the turn it became grey in color since it wasn't directly reflecting the sun's glare.

Brockway, an army medic stationed at airfields during the war, said that the object definitely wasn't a weather balloon or other meteorological device, and that he was positive it wasn't an airplane.

Greeks Closing Guerrilla Trap

ATHENS, July 16 (AP)—Supported by planes and heavy gunfire, the Greek army launched a full-scale attack late today on approximately 2500 guerrillas in the hills north of Ioannina, near the Albanian frontier, military sources reported.

Three hundred irregulars were reported wiped out in one engagement. The main guerrilla force was believed withdrawing eastward in an attempt to make a junction with other leftist fighting in the Grammos mountain range.

Military sources said the army and strafing planes were in hot pursuit, and that infantrymen were eliminating rear-guard forces left behind to cover the withdrawal.

Government Eases Food Procurement

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—The government eased up today on some of its food procurement program for shortage areas abroad to lessen pressure on domestic prices.

It withdrew temporarily from the wheat market and announced that meat exports during the July-September quarter will be reduced about 89 percent from the previous quarter.

It announced also that it will stop buying eggs July 23 for the purpose of supporting producer prices.

11 Sentenced For Contempt Of Congress

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—Eleven members of the joint anti-fascist refugee committee, including novelist Howard Fast, were sentenced to jail terms and fines today on conviction for contempt of congress.

The stiffest sentence in the anti-fascist case went to Dr. Edward K. Barsky, New York surgeon and chairman of the 16-man executive board, who drew six months in jail and a \$500 fine.

The other 10, including Fast, author of historical novels, were each sentenced to three months in jail and a \$300 fine.

The case grew out of the anti-fascist committee's refusal to submit organization records to the house committee on un-American activities. During the trial, the government cited state department, FBI, army and navy records to show that the group was "honeycombed with communists" and that Dr. Barsky was a member of the U. S. communist party executive committee.

Bids Opened On City Leases

Bids were opened Wednesday in City Manager J. L. Franzen's office for the lease of city property on the southwest corner of Trade and South Liberty streets. Highest bidder for the property was found to be the Salem Parking service, now operating at 145 S. Church st., which offered the city \$125 a month for the property.

Franzen said Wednesday afternoon, however, that the council must first approve the bid and final award of the lease would come later.

Other bids for the lease were: Leonard O. VanVleet, \$122.50; Ed J. Lucas, \$110; E. W. Stripling and Richard V. Tillman, each offering \$100.

City May Boost Lease Prices

City Manager J. L. Franzen Wednesday afternoon conferred with four leases of city property along the Willamette river whose leases are near expiration, and stated afterwards that he believes that the present policy of granting leases, for only nominal returns to the city, should come to an end.

Franzen also indicated that costs for leases of city property to other business concerns and lesses in the city should be raised so the city may derive satisfactory returns from them.

Lessees holding city property on the river front include: the Valley Oil company, \$10 a year for space at the foot of Cherokee street; L. R. Tweedie, of Union Fuel Oil company, who pays \$25 a year; Willard Taylor, operating a boat house, on a \$1-a-year basis, from May 1, 1943 to May 1, 1948, but now offering \$35 a month and George Caster, who was granted a lease by the city council June 26, 1941, and paid \$10 on execution, but nothing thereafter.

Bridges Agrees To Truce Ending Pineapple Strike

HONOLULU, July 16 (AP)—Labor peace returned to the fruit-heavy pineapple plantations and empty canneries of Hawaii today under a contract negotiations truce.

The International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union (CIO) last night abruptly called off its five day old strike—marked by some violence and involved legal action—and President Harry Bridges ordered an estimated 12,000 workers to return to their jobs at noon.

The ILWU agreed to send its members back to work pending new sessions around the conference table with representatives of the \$65,000,000 annual pineapple industry on a wage dispute which flared suddenly into a harvest-time walkout with settlement almost in sight.

Security Tax Freeze Passes

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—Legislation freezing the social security tax for the next two years at the present rate of 1 percent each on employees and employers was passed by the senate today in amended form and sent back to the house.

Without the legislation, the tax rate would rise automatically next Jan. 1 to 2 1/2 percent on each.

The house had voted to allow the rate to go up to 1 1/4 percent for the years 1950 through 1956, and to 2 percent thereafter. The senate finance committee recommended, however, that congress postpone permanent changes in social security law pending a complete study of rates, costs and coverage.

Telephone Firm Offers Stock Block to Employees

NEW YORK, July 16 (AP)—American Telephone & Telegraph Co. directors voted today to offer 2,800,000 shares of capital stock to the approximately 600,000 employees of the company and its subsidiaries.

Proceeds will be used for plant extensions and improvements.

West Coast Airlines Opens New Route Today

PORTLAND, July 16 (AP)—West Coast Airlines will open a new Oregon route tomorrow.

Passengers, mail and freight will be carried on two northbound and two southbound flights daily between Portland and Medford. The flights stop at McMinnville, Corvallis, Eugene, and North Bend.

Reds Suggest A-Quota Plan

LAKE SUCCESS, July 16 (AP)—Soviet Russia called today for a third atomic convention which would set up a quota system for lading out atomic materials to countries taking part in a world-wide control plan.

In a surprise declaration to a closed meeting of the political committee of the United Nations atomic energy commission, Andrei A. Gromyko, soviet deputy foreign minister, declared that a

quota system should be established by a special convention. This convention, he said, should contain the points on which nations could assume their obligations in the quota set-up. Frederick H. Cohn, United States, said however he would not discuss quotas at this time.
