

Eaton Claims 'Shooting War' Near in Greece

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—A worldwide study of United States foreign policy was approved today by the house rules committee after it heard Rep. Eaton (R-NJ) declare, "we are in sight of a shooting war at this minute—in Greece."

The committee cleared for house debate two resolutions asked by Eaton, chairman of the house foreign affairs committee, to send members of congress abroad during the summer recess to get their own information on the nation's policies in action.

The white-haired Eaton, a former clergyman, flushed and rose half out of his chair to pound on the table as he told the rules committee in measured tones:

"The Russians, as a result of the Marshall plan, have taken off their masks. There are alien armed forces now in Greece."

"Either America will stand and hold the fort, or Russia will take over. If Russia takes over, the destiny of mankind is once more at stake."

One resolution would authorize foreign affairs subcommittees to investigate areas of the world under their jurisdiction. They could take with them sufficient staff to assemble information on United States operations in those areas. There would be no limit on their activities.

Greeks Sever Guerrilla Lines

ATHENS, Greece, July 18 (AP)—Communist-led guerrillas have been cut up into small bands, scattered over a wide area and are suffering severe losses at the hands of the national air force while racing to escape pursuing ground forces following the abortive thrust at Ioannina in Epirus, a Greek communiqué said today.

In the first news conference since the beginning of the fighting in northern Greece, a spokesman for the Greek general staff said today there were no elements of an international brigade in the attack by guerrillas and no evidence of attempted creation of a communist free state as reportedly planned by the "invaders."

Anthrax Case Found in State

TIGARD, July 18 (AP)—A case of anthrax, deadly cattle disease, was reported today in a dairy herd near Sherwood, but State Veterinarian Charles L. Haynes said precautions had been taken to prevent spread.

Dr. R. G. Vernon, local veterinarian, said one cow in the herd died of the disease. The farm was quarantined and other animals inoculated, and the state veterinarian said the disease was under control.

Anthrax, which can be contracted by humans, was a dangerous plague in Europe until Louis Pasteur discovered a vaccine against it. Isolated anthrax cases have occurred in Oregon. The most recent case was in Baker county in 1941, and the last human fatality in Malheur county in 1932.

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Truman Signs Succession Bill; Martin Next

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—President Truman today signed a bill changing the 60-year-old law of succession for the presidency and in effect designating House Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr. (R-Miss) as the No. 1 replacement for the White House.

Under the new law, Martin would become president in the event Mr. Truman does not finish his term—something Martin says he hopes will not happen.

A member of congress since 1924, Martin is 62—six months younger than Mr. Truman—and a bachelor. He is publisher of the North Attleboro, Mass., Evening Chronicle.

In signing the measure, Mr. Truman achieved a goal he has sought almost since he succeeded to the presidency upon the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt, April 12, 1945.

Two months after entering the White House, Mr. Truman asked congress to break the old tradition of succession, declaring that "so far as possible, the office of the president should be filled by an elective officer."

Under the old law of succession, Secretary of State Marshall would have taken over the White House in case Mr. Truman did not finish his term.

Bradley to Visit Europe

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—A white house announcement bolstered speculation today that Gen. Omar N. Bradley, war-time commander of American forces in Europe, may succeed Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as army chief of staff.

The announcement said Bradley, now serving as chief of the veterans administration, will leave next month on a six-week tour to inspect U. S. army troops and installations in Europe and the Mediterranean area.

The trip was seen as a possible "refresher course" for Bradley to brush up on current army problems in preparation for the chief-of-staff post. Eisenhower announced last June 24 that he will leave the top army job to accept the presidency of Columbia university, New York, effective next year.

Senate to Hold Night Sessions

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Day and night sessions of the senate next week were agreed upon by republican leaders today as they clung to plans for adjournment of congress on July 26—a week from Saturday.

Biggest change in previous senate plans, made at a strategy session of the senate republican policy committee, was addition of a number of veterans bills to the "must list" of legislation. Among them is the house-approved plan to permit immediate payment of some \$1,800,000,000 of terminal pay bonds now held by veterans of world war II.

"I see no reason why we should not finish next week," Senator Taft (R-Ohio), told reporters who waited nearly two hours outside the policy committee closed-door session. Taft heads the committee.

Palmer Hoyton Truman's Air Policy Board

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—President Truman selected a five-man air policy board today and gave it the job of finding what course of action will bring "the greatest possible benefits from aviation."

The aviation industry has dwindled since the war and Mr. Truman wrote the five appointees that "there exists a grave danger that our national security may be jeopardized and our economic welfare diminished through a lowered aircraft production."

The five members are, independent of military, manufacturing or transport aviation interests. They are:

Thomas K. Finletter, New York attorney, chairman.
George P. Baker, Harvard university transportation professor who will be vice chairman.
Henry Ford II, president of Ford Motor company.
Palmer Hoyt, publisher of the Denver Post.
Arthur D. Whitehead of New York, president of Dun & Bradstreet.

12,000 Die, Hurt On Oregon Roads During Past Year

Nearly 12,000 met death or injury on Oregon streets and highways last year to top the pre-war accident casualty peak by 43 per cent, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrel, jr., announced Friday.

Complete summaries listed 11,514 injuries and 482 deaths or a total of 11,996. The previous high was in 1941 with 8,404 deaths and injuries.

Driving law violations figured in nearly 90 per cent of Oregon's 1946 car accident total, Farrel said. Only 6,810 of the 61,305 smashup reports for last year showed the drivers legally in the clear. Others were involved in some traffic violation.

Guards Freed in Slaying of Negroes

BRUNSWICK, Ga., July 18 (AP)—A superior court grand jury today exonerated Warden H. G. Worthy and five guards in the slaying of eight negro convicts in a mass escape attempt at a highway prison camp here a week ago.

The 23-member grand jury returned a special presentment which said evidence "showed the warden and guards were justified in their action under the circumstances."

The warden and guards opened fire with shotguns when 27 negroes, who had balked at road work, attempted to flee the prison camp.

At the close wheat was 1 1/2 to 3 cents lower than yesterday's finish, July \$2.33-2.33 1/2, corn was 1/2 lower, to 1 1/4 higher, July \$2.12 1/2-1/4, and oats were 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, July \$1 1/4-1/4.
