

Mary Walton Funeral Rites 2 p.m. Today

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Walton, who died Sunday night at Salem General hospital, will be today at 2 p. m. at St. Paul's Episcopal church. Interment will be in the family plot at Odd Fellows cemetery.

Mrs. Walton was the widow of James Walton who died in 1911. Born in Quincy, Ill., May 5, 1866, she was the daughter of Elizabeth Keller and Christian Bangert. Left an orphan at an early age, she came to Oregon and settled in Salem in 1879. A life-long member of St. Paul's church, she was one of the oldest members of that congregation.

Surviving are two sons, Brig. Gen. Lee A. Walton of the army air forces and William S. Walton, Salem; five grandchildren, James J. Walton, Margaret Jean Walton, Edmund Spencer Walton, John Walton Sackett, and Marcia Ann Sackett; and three great-grandchildren, Andrew Walton, Elizabeth Walton, and James Walton, Jr. A son, James Walton, Jr., and a daughter, Beatrice Walton Sackett, preceded Mrs. Walton in death.

6-Year-Old Says He Killed Babies In Ohio Hospital

MASSILLION, O., July 21. — (P) A six-year-old boy told Police Chief Stanley W. Switzer today he dropped two baby girls later found dead of fractured skulls at city hospital, but the county prosecutor doubted his story.

The boy, Roge Gue of Navarre, O., was quoted in a statement as saying he was playing with the children while he was a patient there with a broken arm, dropped them, then placed them back dying in their cribs. Prosecutor D. Deane McLaughlin insisted: "Our investigation continues. I talked with Mr. and Mrs. Gue in their Navarre home. Both expressed doubt that Roger was telling the truth."

Guerrillas Strike Greece, Retreat

ATHENS, July 21. — (P) — Press dispatches said today that more than 700 guerrillas had retreated across the Yugoslav border after weekend attacks on three villages in northern Greece.

Advices from Salonika said 400 leftists attacked Moures, 25 miles north of Salonika, and had been repulsed by the 38th company of mountain commandos. Ten guerrillas were killed, as against army losses of two killed and two wounded, the dispatches said.

Rail Strength Buoy Market

NEW YORK, July 21. — (P) — Quiet strength of selected rails and industrial helped the stock market today although exceptions were plentiful and dealings the slowest of the month.

Boardrooms reported that the President's economic message to congress provided scant ammunition for either the bulls or bears but the fact that the white house stressed inflation buoyed the arguments of those who have recently been on the buying side because of this factor. Rising freight traffic for June and prospects for boosted passenger and shipping rates aided the transportation group. Foreign affairs and labor situations again were restraints.

Transfers of 840,000 shares compared with 920,000 Friday and were a low since June 30. The Associated Press 60-stock composite was off .1 of a point at 67.1. The rail average was up 6 but the industrials and utilities fell.

Hazel Smith Dies Of Heart Attack

Funeral services will be held in Menominee, Mich., later this week for Hazel Smith, about 40, who died Saturday after a heart attack which occurred Saturday at Depoe Bay after she and a party of Chemawa summer school instructors had returned from a sightseeing cruise.

Chemawa officials said she was stricken suddenly and taken to a doctor's office where she died before a doctor could be obtained. Arrangements for sending the body to Michigan were made with relatives by telephone from the school. Miss Smith has been serving with the Indian service at Albuquerque, N. M.
