

Indian School To Continue Despite Cut

Despite long - threatened closing due to a reduced interior department budget, Chemawa Indian school here will operate again for the coming school year.

This was the word brought back to Salem Wednesday by Willard W. Beatty, director of Indian education from the Indian bureau offices in Chicago, who asserted Chemawa operation is assured under an \$11,189,790 compromise appropriation for Indian education recently agreed by a congressional conference committee.

Beatty returned to the Chemawa summer school for Indian service leaders after conferring with Indian bureau officials in Chicago over effects of the budget compromise.

The local summer training session of the past month, attended by 155 Indian education leaders, will end with Friday's classes. A farewell dance will be held at Chemawa tonight.

M. W. Evans, Chemawa superintendent, said the regular school enrollment for the coming year will be reduced from last year's 440 to about 400 Indian students with its staff expected to number 65 or 70. Some key staff members who took new jobs when Chemawa's future became uncertain probably will be replaced by civil service employees from other Indian service jobs eliminated in the budget cut, Evans said.

Stanley Lectures On Death Valley

Orrin E. Stanley of the Portland city engineer's department, presented by the Salem Geological society, addressed a capacity crowd at Collins hall on the Willamette university campus Wednesday night with an illustrated lecture on Death Valley.

Stanley, accompanied by three Portlanders, joined an annual trip to Death Valley, sponsored by the College of the Pacific, which left Stockton, Calif., last April, during which he accumulated the pictures he used to illustrate the lecture. The party was divided into three groups interested in physical science, geology and photography, each of which collaborated information at the end of the tour. College credit was given those who completed the tour, Stanley said.

Gains Small in Grain Market

CHICAGO, July 23 (AP)—Grains ended with moderate gains on the board of trade today, late selling reducing an advance which had carried all oats contracts and all deferred deliveries of corn to new seasonal highs.

Price fluctuations in July deliveries were highly erratic in the final minutes, featured by the action of oats. This contract closed on a split quotation of \$1.05 to 98 cents. July wheat ended at \$2.38 1/2-2.39 1/2 and July corn at \$2.18-2.19.

Deferred contracts of wheat ended 1/4-3/4 higher, deferred corn 1 1/4-1 1/2 higher and deferred oats 1/4-1/4 higher.

Wheat showed only moderate response to re-entry of the commodity credit corporation into the cash market in the southwest.

AHOSKIE, N. C., July 23 (AP)—They're going to give Harvey Jones a check for \$3,200 tomorrow.

Jones is the 23-year-old negro war veteran who held the winning ticket in the Ahoskie Kiwanis club's raffle for a \$3,200 Cadillac recently but who was denied the prize because negroes were barred from the dance at which the drawing was held.

But tomorrow luck is finally catching up with the struggling young farmer. Club officials, eager to make amends for the incident—termed by them a "misunderstanding"—voted today to reward him with money instead of a car.

Dutch Capture Indonesi Port

BATAVIA, Java, Thursday, July 24 (AP)—Dutch troops driving in from three sides have captured the important north Java coast port of Cheribon, semi-official dispatches from the Cheribon area said today.

The Indonesian news agency Antara reported that republican forces had recaptured the town of Salatiga and driven the Dutch back approximately 12 miles to the north. The Dutch yesterday had reported their troops three miles south of Salatiga, which is about 30 miles from the republican capital of Jogjakarta.



Jap Spies on Coast Aimed Sub's Guns At Fort Stevens

ASTORIA, Ore., July 23 (AP)—Records of Fort Stevens revealed today that enemy agents on shore signalled Japanese submarines shelling the army installations at the entrance to the Columbia river the nights of June 21-22, 1942.

The account of the shelling, the first attack on a U. S. continental military base in 120 years—since the war of 1812, was made by Col. C. S. Doney, then commander. Ten five-inch shells struck the beach without damage or injury.

American guns were silent those nights, Col. Doney noted in the fort records, because of lack of effective weapons and shortage of ammunition. He added that "friendly sympathizers were seen by the army signalling from the beach."
