Dutch Near End Of Java Conquest, Turn to Politics

BATAVIA, Java, July 25 (AP)—The Dutch declared today they virtually had completed the first phase of their military operations in Java, and Dutch officials indicated they now were turning to political consolidation of their position through organization of a new Indonesian government. Acting Governor General Hubertus J. Van Mook declared a "regular government" would work in cooperation with the Indonesians, toward formation of a United States of Indonesia. High republican circles in the Indonesian capital of Jogjakarta gave no sign, however, that the forces of the republic were preparing to abandon the fight.

LONDON, July 25 (AP)—The police and homeless maneuvered from dawn to dusk today around a 300-acre Berkshire country estate which may become the honeymoon home of Princess Elizabeth and her husband-to-be -- or be occupied by bombed-out subjects of the future queen. Objective of the reconnaissance by the prospective squatters was a settlement of 300 huts on the manor or house lawn. Royal Air force men moved out of the huts last week after the press had reported that Sunninghill, as the estate is called, was likely to be the new home of Princess Elizabeth and St. Philip Mountbatten. "We're waiting," said one of the leaders, "to see whether they tear down the huts so this will be a 'proper' place for the princess to live. If they try it, in we move. Some of us may move in anyhow."

Forest Road Fund Compromise Set

Compromise in appropriation of funds for forest road projects was reached by the senate - house conference committee, according to a telegram Friday from U. S. Sen. Guy Cordon to County Judge Grant Murphy, regarding action on the agriculture department budget. The senate, which had approved higher funds, won a victory in the committee's recommendation for \$11,000,000 for forest development roads, over the house's \$10,000,000. But the group recommended only \$5,300,000, the house figure, for forest highways, rather than the \$8,300,000 approved by the senate.
