

Revocation of Hauling Permit Draws Protest

A protest against revocation last week of a county road log-hauling permit to Floyd R. Persons, Stayton, was lodged with the Marion county court at hearing Monday. The court said the order would stand until the state highway commission modifies it.

The persons permit, along with those of Ivan W. Haines, Albany, and Vancouver, Plywood company, were revoked by the court Friday on recommendation of the state highway department. The permits involved a two-mile stretch of road just west of Stayton creek on the North Santiam highway under construction, where, according to the highway commission, the operations involved were interfering with traffic.

At the hearing Monday the log-haulers denied their operations hampered the construction of the road or that they interfered with traffic on the road any more than did any other traffic. They also stated that about one and a half million feet of timber lay cut ready to be hauled out.

The county has turned over control of the road in that area to the state commission, Marion County Judge Grant Murphy said.

Attending the hearing were James E. McCrea, Ford M. Converse, Russell L. Hecox, and J. C. Ames, all of Stayton; D. A. Gessner, Stayton; F. R. Persons, Stayton; and Val N. Herron, Mill City. Also present were N. N. Stuffer, assistant staff engineer of the state highway commission, and L. L. Spaulding, chief weighmaster of the commission.

China to Veto Mongolian Bid To Join U.N.

LAKE SUCCESS, July 28—(AP) China turned down United Nations' bid for United Nations membership today with an unprecedented blast which drew a Russian retort that certain far east parties might like to force a U.N. investigation similar to the Greek case.

Calmly announcing a certain Chinese veto on the Outer Mongolian application, Dr. Shuhsi Hsiang, chairman of a security council session that an "armed invasion" of the Chinese province of Sinkiang by the applicant state "has not ended even today." He said China had cast aside doubts last year and supported the Mongolian peoples republic.

Alexei N. Krasnikov, Russian participant in the heated exchanges in the committee last week over Albania, called the Chinese statement "distorted" and "false." He said that a regiment of Chinese soldiers penetrated about 12 miles into Outer Mongolian territory and was thrust out by the Outer Mongolian soldiers who never crossed the Chinese border.

He also declared that the bodies of five Outer Mongolian men who had been tortured were found in the area occupied by the Chinese troops.

Such provocative actions on the part of the Chinese troops and certain incidents are to remind us of similar action on the northern border of Greece," Krasnikov said. "It is possible there are parties in the far east who would like to repeat what has happened in Greece, also to detract the world from the civil war in China and what is going on in China."

Marines to Decide Wednesday Group To Attend Camp

A group of members of the Salem marine corps reserve, C battery, Fourth 105 mm battalion, will attend the marine reserves' annual two-week encampment beginning August 9 at Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Who will go is to be decided at the group's weekly meeting Wednesday night at Salem airport, according to M. Sgt. F. A. Hancock, member of the reserves' inspector-instructor staff from Portland.

Maj. Leonard G. Hicks, Salem, commanding officer of the outfit, will lead the group to camp. During the camp period new reserve members will be given basic training. Sgt. Hancock said, and older members will take part in refresher courses on the camp near Oceanside, Calif.

Wednesday's meeting will begin at 8 o'clock in building number T5-14 near the west entrance to the airport.

Drivers' License Deadline Near

Motorists were warned Monday by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr., that July 31 is the last day on which drivers licenses numbered up to R-33,000 are valid. Those failing to apply by that time will be violating the law.

Under the new system every Oregon driver's license expires within the next two years. The licenses are being renewed at the rate of 33,000 a month.

Licenses 5 R-33,000 to 5 R-66,000 expire in July and those numbered 5 R-66,000 to 5 R-99,000 in August.

Atomic Age World Fair Proposed for Portland

PORTLAND, July 28—(AP)—An atomic age and hydroelectric world's fair here in 1955 was proposed by a spokesman for the Federation of Community Clubs of Multnomah county.

Peter W. Welch said the event, coming a half century after the Lewis and Clark world's fair here in 1905, could be staged on Swan Island, where utilities installed during the war for the Kaiser shipyard could be used.

Pilots Revive Disc Stories

BOISE, Idaho, July 28—(AP)—The crew of a Seattle-bound United air line mainliner reported to-night the sighting of a disc-like object in the sky between Mountain Home and Boise as the west-bound transport was preparing to land here.

Capt. Charles F. Gibson and First Officer Jack Harvey reported to the Gowen field control tower here by radio that they had sighted the object at an approximate altitude of 9010 feet as the twin-engine liner was flying at 7500 over the village of Mountain Home.

The transport was trip 105, the same trip from which, on July 4, came the report from Capt. E. T. Smith that he, his copilot and stewardess had seen nine flying disc-like objects over Emmet, west of Boise.

Gibson said it was flat and round. He said he watched it for "two or three minutes." He said at first he thought it was an airplane and then decided it wasn't.

Reserves See Combat Films, Hear Speeches

Films showing the combat action on the beaches in the invasion of Normandy and staff discussions by Lt. Col. Eugene E. Laird and Capt. Kenneth Potts, made up the program for a combined meeting of Salem's three army reserve units at the state forestry building Monday night.

The films were shown by Master Sgt. Donald Riddle, an instructor for the reserve units. Lt. Col. Laird discussed martial law and domestic disturbances and highlighted his talk by telling of some personal experiences with domestic disturbances in California prior to World War II. Captain Potts discussed dealing with handling of army messes.

A turnout of approximately 30 staff officers and non-commissioned officers attended the meeting which included the 3rd battalion, 415th infantry regiment, 104th division, commanded by Lt. Col. Laird, the 369th boat and shore unit, commanded by Col. George Spaur, and the 409th quartermasters section commanded by Maj. Homer Lyon.

Next meeting of the group will be on August 25th.

Charter Given Umatilla Bank

Application for a charter for the proposed inland Empire state bank at Umatilla was approved by A. A. Rogers, state superintendent of banks, Monday. It will have a capital stock of \$25,000.

Rogers said the bank probably would not be opened for four or five months when a new building now under construction will be completed. Application for the charter was signed by F. B. Swayze, Roger J. Bounds and A. H. Norton Swayze is president of the First National bank at Hermiston.

Superintendent of Nurses at Local Hospital Resigns

Retirement of Selma Hilmer, 1074 S. Liberty, as superintendent of nurses at Salem Deaconess hospital was announced Monday by F. F. Wedel, hospital manager.

Miss Hilmer, who has been with the organization since 1937, said she will take an extended trip through midwest and eastern states but has no further plans.

Miss Hilmer was honored Monday night at a reception given by hospital employees, at the A. E. Beckett home on Mission street.

Formerly of Milwaukie, Ore., she graduated from nursing school at Deaconess hospital in Spokane. On Sept. 1, 1937, she came to the Salem hospital as night supervisor on the maternity floor, was made supervisor of maternity department in March 1938, assistant superintendent of nurses in March 1940 and superintendent in 1942.

Albert Gragg Notified of Postmaster Appointment

Albert Gragg received official notification Monday of his appointment as Salem postmaster. After certain forms are filled out and returned to Washington, he will be sworn in probably by one of the local supervisors. He has been acting postmaster since July 1, 1945, when Henry Crawford retired.

Vet Job Office Convention to Open Today

Opening sessions will be given over to talks by William Gaerstrom, state director of veterans affairs; J. R. Smithwaite, veterans employment representative for Oregon; T. Morris Dunne, chairman of the state unemployment compensation commission; Silas Gaiser, administrator of the UCC; Norman Nilson, state director of apprentice training; and F. C. Maloney, representing the state board for vocational education.

On Wednesday and Thursday panel discussions will be held on various problems of veterans' employment. R. F. Baxter, supervisor of benefits for the UCC, will talk on job-seeking questionnaires.

Wednesday night several officials of the veterans employment service will be interviewed over local radio stations KSLM and KOCO.

Damages Sought in False Arrest Suit Filed Against Store

A false arrest suit against Safeway Stores, Inc., and "John Doe" Weems, filed in Marion county circuit court Monday, demands \$9,000 damages for reported "injuries and embarrassment" allegedly suffered by 16-year-old Stonewall Jackson, Jr., at the hands of a store employee.

Brought by Helen F. Jackson, guardian, the complaint charges that the youth was held and searched in the back room of a Safeway store located "between First and Front streets" here on April 5. The complaint states he was shopping at the store with two companions.

Damages are asked because, according to the complaint, young Jackson suffered a twisted arm, an injured reputation, and is now reportedly "reluctant and unhappy about entering public places."

General Motors Reopens Plants

DETROIT, July 28—(AP)—General Motors' larger car assembly plants, closed since July 18 to permit the accumulation of sheet steel and other materials, reopened today, giving promise that this week's passenger automobile production would move upward again.

Ford's Mercury and Lincoln plants were closed today, however, because of a supplier plant strike.

Board to Discuss Advance Payments To Flax Growers

The state board of control, at a meeting here today, will consider advance payments to flax growers whose product is contracted by the state flax industry at the state penitentiary.

This year's contracts cover approximately 3,000 acres.

For No. 1 flax the state is paying \$60 a ton, for No. 2 flax \$48 a ton and No. 3 flax from \$13 to \$14 a ton. The advance payments are made on the basis of 50 per cent of the contract price. Two other payments will be authorized later.

Roy Mills, board secretary, said much of the land in the Salem area is producing two tons of flax to the acre. Flax deliveries at the penitentiary were expected to reach their peak within two or three weeks.
