

Farm Labor Job Division to Return to State, Veterans' Office Representatives Meet in Salem

Return of the farm worker job placement division of the U. S. department of agriculture to the state unemployment compensation commission after an absence of five years, was announced Tuesday by T. Morris Dunne, UCC chairman.

Dunne made the report at the opening session Tuesday morning in the capital building of a three-day state conference of veterans employment representatives from local employment service offices over the state. He said the change would be made some time next year. Currently, job placements for agriculture workers are handled by local farm labor offices. In talks by state and federal officials to the assembled veterans employment representatives, it was revealed that only from 2 to 3 per cent of Oregon's estimated 175,000 veterans are drawing unemployment benefits. Veterans make up about 45 per cent of UCC's activities. In 1941, veterans comprised 4 per cent of those drawing unemployment compensation, the delegates were told.

Panel Discussions

Panel discussions among the 60 delegates from the 29 local employment service offices will occupy the conference today. This morning Clifford E. Long, Portland, will conduct a panel on "Community Participation," while Guy E. Barker, Astoria, will lead a panel in "Job Developments."

This afternoon Fletcher R. Milton of LaGrande is to be chairman of the panel on "Advisory Committees" and E. E. Benner, Klamath Falls, will direct a discussion on "Placement of Veterans."

Speakers Noted

In addition to Dunne, Tuesday morning speakers were: William Gaarenstroom, state director of veterans affairs; Norman Nilson, state director of apprentice training; F. C. Maloney, representing the state board for vocational education; Silas Gaiser, administrator of the UCC, and Earl Lovell, director of the state employment service and chairman of the conference. All are of Salem.

Tuesday afternoon, Portland representatives from the state departments of the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans and Veterans of Foreign Wars conducted a panel discussion outlining ways and means their organizations could aid local employment service officials in obtaining jobs for veterans.

Anti-Liquor Ad Initiative Filed

Preliminary initiative measure which would restrict liquor, beer and wine advertising in Oregon was filed in the state department here Tuesday by the Oregon anti-liquor league.

The measure was signed by B. N. Hicks, Oregon City, legislative chairman; R. E. Abbott, secretary, and E. M. Hancock.

In event completed petitions, containing 18,969 signatures are filed by July 1, 1948, the measure will go on the ballot at the next general election. The measure would limit the advertising to the name of the producer or dispenser, the name of the product, the place where it is sold, and the price. So-called promotion advertising of alcoholic beverages would be banned. The advertiser would be penalized but not the medium carrying the advertisement. The act would become law February 1, provided it is approved by the voters.

Photographs of China on Display At WU Campus

An exhibit, "Peiping," a group of panel photograph views of Peiping are on display at Willamette university library until August 28. The 25 large panels, many 28x38 inches, were taken by Dmitri Kessel, Life magazine's photographer. Some were published in a recent issue of Life; many are unpublished.

Among the superb examples of architecture pictured in the large panels are those of views of the Forbidden City and the Inner Starry Wicket Gate to the Altar of Heaven.

The pictures, enlarged from the photographer's own negatives, show unusual clarity, say the critics. The exhibition is open to the public. It has been on display for the past month at San Francisco museum of art and will go in September to Mills College.

U.S. to Beam New Program to Reds

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—A new 30-minute program of news and music hereafter will stream out over the "Voice of America" aimed directly at the Moscow area. It steps up by 50 per cent this country's official broadcasting to the Russians.

It was indicated the expansion came at the suggestion of Walter B. Smith, U. S. ambassador to Russia.

The state department has begun a 40 per cent reduction in broadcasts to other countries, conforming with a reduction in its budget by congress.

Jaycees Join Campaign to Cleanse River

Declaring Salem's sewage disposal procedure a "disgrace," Jim Wilkinson, business manager of plumbers and steamfitters labor local, Tuesday offered the support of local organized labor to Salem Junior Chamber of Commerce members in their proposed plans to publicize the need for cleaning up the Willamette river.

Salem's plans for a sewage disposal plant are incomplete if they do not include a filter plant, Wilkinson said. The Willamette will remain an open sewer as long as Salem and other Willamette valley cities continue dumping sewage and waste into the river, he said. Other labor officials told of last year's campaign to clean up the Center street bridge outlet when conditions were made intolerable by hot weather and low water in the stream. Present at the luncheon besides Wilkinson were Herbert Barker, executive secretary of the Salem central labor council, and F. D. VanSweringen, business manager of the building trades union.

General Electric's movie "Clean Waters" depicting the toll taken of wild life, reduction of property value and menace to health caused by waters polluted with sewage was shown by Pat Crossland of the Portland General Electric Co. Members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce are conducting a campaign to raise \$500 for a civic welfare activity fund. It is to be used in combating unsanitary sewage conditions in Salem and in promoting a clean-up campaign of the Willamette river.

Nip Scientists Recognized Atom Bomb

TOKYO, Wednesday, July 30 (AP)—A supersecret Japanese report on the first atomic bomb at Hiroshima in 1945 showed that their scientists quickly recognized that the United States had loosed an atomic weapon and that they had an inkling of how it was achieved.

A long-hidden report details how the Japanese discovered that destruction at Hiroshima was accompanied by radiation effects, then continues:

"The possibility of the atomic explosion mechanism emitting a tremendous amount of energy... a chain reaction that upon artificial disintegration a U (uranium) nucleus by a neutron... another U atom would be destroyed by this neutron."
"As for the technical problems in practice to realize the above principles we cannot but leave them all to inventors in the future."

The report, whether technically of any accuracy or not, was enough to convince the high command in Tokyo that the United States had outstripped the world in development of atomic armaments.

Within a few days after the report from Hiroshima was received, the Japanese began peace negotiations.

FAIR OFFICIAL, NAMED

Edwin Ridder, Sherwood, was appointed Tuesday as superintendent of the swine division of the Oregon state fair which opens here September 1. Fair manager Leo Spitzbart warned prospective exhibitors that all entries in the various livestock classifications of the fair must be made by August 20.

AUTOMOBILES COLLIDE

Cars driven by Doris Janet Mix, 335 N. Summer st., and Clinton Adin Blakley, Salem, collided at Front and Center streets shortly after 4 p.m. Tuesday afternoon, with considerable damage to both cars, city police records state. Only injury was to Mrs. Ralph Cole, a passenger with Mrs. Mix, who received a bump on the head.

Legislation Backs Renewal of Hop Market Contracts

Last-minute legislation reported to favor renewal of hop market agreements passed the senate Saturday, according to word received here this week from Sen. Guy Corbin by the Salem office of the United States Hop Growers association.

The bill, HR 452, authorizes operation of federal marketing agreements for certain limited functions even while prices are above parity. It now goes to President Truman for his signature. Associate Manager Paul T. Howell of the hop growers association here indicated that hop growers in Pacific coast states have been considering re-establishment of a hop marketing agreement. He further contended that enactment of HR 452 should facilitate such efforts.

Railroad Worker Held in Lieu of Bail On Assault Charge

Curtis Stegall, Turner, is being held in the Marion county jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail for the grand jury on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon after his arrest Monday by Marion county deputies, court records show.

Stegall was arrested in connection with the use of a four-foot railroad track lifter, now held as evidence by the sheriff's office, which he allegedly used to bludgeon a fellow negro railroad worker on the head near Turner, sheriff's deputies said. The complainant in Stegall's arrest, was taken to a Salem hospital, where he received eight stitches for a scalp wound and was released Tuesday, according to the sheriff's office. Stegall on Tuesday was given preliminary examination by the Marion county district court before being bound over to the grand jury.

C. C. KNAPP APPOINTED

C. C. Knapp has been appointed by Attorney General George Neuner as attorney for the Portland office of the state labor commission. This appointment was made under a 1947 law providing that all attorneys for state departments shall be appointed by the attorney general.

Justice Douglas' Tonsils Removed

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29 (AP)—Justice William O. Douglas of the U.S. supreme court rested comfortably here tonight following a tonsillectomy at the Physicians and Surgeons hospital.

The justice earlier said he had been bothered by periodic throat infections. He expected to return to his Lodi river summer home in a few days.
