Delinquency Laid to 'Speed' In Rotary Talk

Delinquency of people was laid to "doing too many things in too big a hurry" by Capt. Walter Lansing of the Oregon state police in a talk before Salem Rotary club Wednesday noon in the Marion hotel.

If the institutions are not doing a good job of caring for the persons entrusted to their care it

is the fault of the citizens, the law enforcement officer said.

The term "delinquency of people" was chosen by the speaker in preference to "juvenile delinquency," since he said it was impossible to determine who were juveniles since neither size nor age was a sufficient guide.

"People start spoiling the child in the cradle because it is harder to do otherwise," Lansing said.

"It is time for people to wake up. Crime is on the increase, it costs 2 1/2 billion dollars a year and puts half a million of its people in prison, where we cannot see them; something has to be done about it."

Speaking from his own observations, the officer told of what he, as a citizen, is doing about it.

"I take my small grandson fishing, and find he likes to be with me, while I try to interest him in following the man-made rules of society which govern us."

Justice Arthur Hay of Oregon supreme court introduced the speaker.

A.C. Wirsching Funeral Today

Funeral services for August C. Wirsching, who died Monday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Roy Scofield, Silverton road, will be at 2 p.m. today from Weddle's Funeral home in Stayton. Burial will be at Stayton cemetery, and the Rev. Wilmer Brown will officiate.

Mr. Wirsching was born in Germany, Jan. 12, 1871, and came at the age of four years to the United States, of which he became a naturalized citizen in 1898. His family settled in Illinois and later in Nebraska. On Oct. 19, 1898, he was married to Anna Lowery Lawhead, who survives. They came to Oregon in 1909, residing in Eugene and Marshfield. Due to Mr. Wirsching's poor health, they came to Salem in 1939 to reside at the home of their daughter.

Other survivors are a grandson, Gene Scofield, in the U.S. navy at San Diego, and a brother, John Helmut, Oconto, Nebr.

Counties Share Vehicle Funds

First apportionment of \$2,481.151.58 of state motor vehicle funds under a new law of the 1947 legislature increasing the counties' share from 15.27 to 19 per cent, was announced here Wednesday by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, jr.

The apportionment represented registration fees, motor fuels taxes, motor carrier fees and receipts from motor vehicle law violation fines for the first six months of this year. The distribution to the counties was based on the number of motor vehicles registered in each county during 1946.

Counties' shares included: Benton \$44,353.74, Linn \$84,505.37, Marion \$158,991.61, Polk \$42,516.32.
