

Negro Voting Dispute Ends With 2 Deaths

MOSELLE, Miss., Aug. 6 (AP)—District Attorney Homer Pittman said two men were charged with murder today as a result of a shooting arising from an election argument over negro voting in yesterday's democratic primary.

He identified them as Walter and Ellis Gerald.

They are charged, he said, with slaying R. W. Phillips, 44, during an argument between the two Gerald brothers and two Phillips brothers. The other Phillips brother, Otis, was wounded and is undergoing hospital treatment at Hattiesburg.

Pittman said his investigation showed Walter Gerald aided two negroes to vote yesterday. He said that when the negroes' votes were challenged, Walter called Laurel, Miss. Jones county seat, ascertained that they were properly registered and passed this information to poll officials. As a result, Pittman said, the negroes were allowed to vote.

Early today, Pittman said, Ellis Gerald and another brother, whose name he did not reveal, engaged in an argument with the Phillips brothers again and another argument ensued. During the argument, Pittman said, Ellis shot both of the Phillips.

BATAVIA, Java, Aug. 6 (AP)—An American consular official in two personal broadcasts succeeded tonight in informing the isolated Indonesian republican government at Jogjakarta of a United States offer to mediate the conflict in the East Indies.

This unusual procedure was decided upon by U. S. Consul General Walter A. Foote after A. K. Gani, Indonesian deputy premier, was unable to contact Jogjakarta with the message.

Chest Drive Organizers to Meet Tonight

A meeting for the re-establishment and reorganization of the Marion county community chest in preparation for the fall campaign between October 7 and 16 will be held tonight at 8 o'clock at the Salem Chamber of Commerce, H. L. Braden, executive secretary, announced Wednesday.

Expected to attend tonight's meeting are men and women from all areas of the county who have been contacted recently by Carl W. Hogg, A. C. Haag, Henry Kropp and Braden.

Budget Committee
After election of a board of directors tonight, it will name a president, vice president and secretary-treasurer. A budget committee will be appointed to ascertain amounts of money to be paid the various participating agencies and to establish quotas for the areas of the county. An admission committee, to decide on acceptance of agencies seeking chest support by the Marion county organization, will also be appointed.

Money raised in the county effort is to go to agencies receiving state-wide support and does not apply to the Salem community chest. Of a grand total of \$436,593 to be raised by state-wide support, Marion county is asked to raise \$18,151 of which Salem contributes 60 per cent and Marion county outside Salem 40 per cent. Additional funds are also to be raised for the support of the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Salvation Army and Camp Fire Girls. Amounts they are to receive are to be decided at tonight's meeting when the county total will be made known.

Receiving Support
Agencies receiving state-wide support and amounts they receive are:

Boys' and Girls' Aid society, \$85,600; Catholic Charities Children's bureau, \$91,824; Children's Farm home, \$32,000; Oregon Mental Hygiene society, \$15,743; Oregon Protective society, \$74,853; Salvation Army's White Shield home, \$30,000; Volunteers of America's Mothers' and Children's home, \$9,700; Waverly Baby home, \$41,500; Oregon Prison association, \$9,000; YMCA service men's program, \$7,000; as a safety factor on Oregon agencies, \$11,917; and for campaign expense and administration, \$27,456.

'I Told You So', Chides Morse Eyeing Results of Labor Law

EUGENE, Aug. 6 (AP)—Senator Wayne Morse, sunburned and rested from a week at the Oregon beaches, stopped in Eugene Wednesday before continuing on up the McKenzie river for additional vacation.

Morse answered questions from newsmen regarding the Taft-Hartley labor law with a blast at the bill as "bootleg" legislation, "the worst since the eighteenth amendment."

"I am somewhat amused," the senator said, looking very unamused, "at the doubts already expressed as to the workability of the Taft-Hartley bill by some of my critics who were so vehement in protest at my vote against that bill."

"Some of these critics whom I've met since my return to Oregon already have confessed to me that the law was not working out. They're beginning to see what I wanted."

By "bootleg" Senator Morse explained that he meant "a law which is producing collusion, evasion, and fraudulent contracts on the part of both employers and labor groups. They are entering into sub rosa agreements which are in clear violation of the law, but in an attempt to get around the law."

"This action," he pointed out, "is not helping government by law, but undermining it."

Senator Morse said he would return from his trip to the Cascade mountain area on Monday, and would be in his summer offices here on that day.

Keller Quits Hospital

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (AP)—Charles Keller, the powerful New York Yankee outfielder, departed for his Frederick, Md., home today after leaving a hospital where he underwent a spinal operation on July 18.

The operation for the removal of a disc in his spine was pronounced a success but it was considered doubtful that he would be able to play baseball again this season.

Truman Vetoes U.S. Science Foundation Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6 (AP)—President Truman today vetoed legislation for a national science foundation, along with seven other bills, and took congress to task for what he termed a proposed infringement on the powers of the president.

Mr. Truman also chided congress for passing a measure which, he said, "restricts and narrows coverage of our social security law." That bill, which he vetoed, would have relieved certain vendors of newspapers and magazines and their employees from paying social security taxes.

He expressed "deep regret" at killing the science foundation measure. It would have created a 24-member committee of scientists, appointed by the president, to control the expenditure of millions of dollars annually for research into defense and health problems. No money was actually appropriated under it.

He declared that the bill contains provisions representing "a marked departure from sound principles for the administration of public affairs."

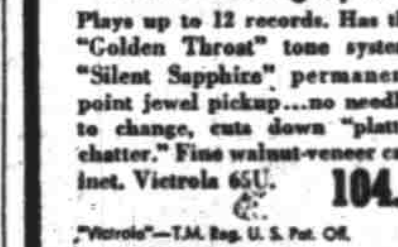
