SCOUT TRIP CANCELLED

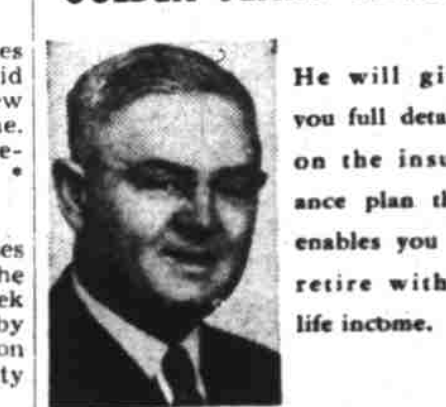

Col. Weaver Tells Club of Dam Program

Calling not only for facts but for "truth about the facts," Col. Theron D. Weaver, division engineer for the corps of engineers, discussed the work of the Columbia basin inter-agency committee before the Rotary club Wednesday. The committee is endeavoring to agree on plans for the future development of the Columbia basin.

The recommendation of the interior department for a moratorium of ten years on dam-building, though permitting construction of the Foster creek and McNary dams, is now under review by the inter-agency committee following hearings at Walla Walla and Lewiston.

Col. Weaver discussed the protests of the fish interests against damming but cited the count of migrating fish at Bonneville as proof of the value of works there provided for fish passage. He expressed real concern for the Celio

Indians whose ancestors fished the Columbia from time immemorial and said the government must make proper provision for them, though he questioned the rights of the Yakimas and Cayuse and Warm Springs Indians to rights at Celio.

The purpose of the federal agencies is to promote development in the best interest of the region. Hearings are held to get the voice of the public and every effort is made to get full information and then make proper conclusions from it, said the colonel who before the war was an army engineer assigned to duty in the building of Bonneville dam.

RAIN DELAYS HARVEST
PORTLAND, Aug. 6 (AP)—A harvest delay because of last week's rain—with some damage to wheat, oats, peas, vetch and barley west of the Cascades was reported today by the U.S. weather bureau.

The bureau forecast little rain for Oregon during the rest of this week.
