

Forest Fires Dot Louisiana

Fire fighters apparently won out yesterday over a series of brush and forest fires in the west but Louisiana crews battled the worst outbreak in the state's history.

Damage exceeded \$1,000,000 in Louisiana. More than 600 men were fighting at least 77 separate blazes, many of them, however, in sparsely settled areas. A prolonged drought so parched the forests that mature green trees were burning like dry branches, said W. M. Palmer of the Louisiana forestry commission.

The big Tujunga canyon fire near Los Angeles, which caused three deaths, injuries or burns to 200 fire fighters, and scorching of 4,000 acres of watershed since Tuesday, was pronounced under control.

Train Blown from Track By Jewish Underground

Flax Float Wins Mt. Angel Fete Parade Honors

MT. ANGEL, Aug. 9—Mt. Angel flax plant, with a float depicting flax in its many forms of processing, won the sweepstakes cup in the Mt. Angel Flax Festival Saturday. The float was designed by Fred J. Schwab and Henrietta Salsfield, manager and secretary, respectively, of the local flax plant.

Attracting attention in the parade was a 1911 Model T Ford driven to Mt. Angel from Salem in 1 hour and 25 minutes by Al Heining, of Portland, and the Schwab commission float which depicted a birthday party with 15 youngsters, 9 of which were Schwab grandchildren.

Parade judges were Parzy Rose, Silverton; Harry Hart, Salem; and L. D. Baker, Portland.

Other features on the day's program included a tour of Mt. Angel industrial plants and the Mt. 'Tommies' to Stay in Greece

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9—(AP)—Great Britain was reported by diplomatic authorities today to have reassured the United States that British troops will not be hastily pulled out of Greece, despite earlier plans to withdraw them by autumn.

The British force now there is small, numbering only about 6,000 men, but both American and British officials regard the presence of this group as a stabilizing factor in Greece.

Fresh rumors that it would be withdrawn as part of Britain's economy program were described authoritatively here as at least partly responsible for an increase in popular jitters in Greece recently.
