Only Five Vacancies Remain on Salem Schools' Teaching Staff; Bids Reopened on Project

Only five vacancies must be filled to complete Salem public schools' teaching staff for the coming year, Superintendent Frank B. Bennett told the district 24 school board Tuesday night.

The board approved the offering of contracts to enough applicants to fill all positions, including a possible two more resignations.

Resignations were accepted by the board from Ruth Clark, Richmond; Irene Duncan, Parrish; Dorothy Hennen, Englewood; Glen Wagener, Highland; and Eleanor Davis, who was to have taught at Washington school.

New teachers elected last night for the coming year are Theodore Pierson, senior high; Genevieve Russell, home visiting teacher; Maynard Nelson, Leslie; Kathryn McKennon, Garfield; Mildred Parsons, Washington; Jean Burgess Parrish; Maxine Herring, Parrish; Alta Bronovitch, Leslie; Robert K. Anderson, Leslie; Dorothy Bates, Englewood; Nancy Craig, Leslie, and Mary Young Swegart, Richmond.

Other personnel action included promotion of Frank Stone from inspector to veterans' coordinator at the senior high school, and staff adjustments at the high school to permit expanded training connected with auto driving and auto mechanics, for which the board voted to accept a dual control auto offered by the American Automobile association.

Planners Seek Harmony in State Buildings

Salem's long-range planning commission Tuesday night instructed its public buildings committee to use the state board of control and state commissions planning new buildings to maintain architectural harmony and to erect the new state office structures in the vicinity of Salem's present capitol zone.

The long-range commission referred to Carl Hogg's off-street parking committee a letter outlining Mayor R. L. Elstrom's recommendations for development of city-leased downtown lots for metered parking, in order to provide city parking of parking and to reduce the cost, shoppers' waiting time and fixed location drawings to off-street parking plans involving a large parking building.

Commissioners also decided to consult the Marion county court and Salem Agricultural Housing, Inc. regarding possible use of Salem farm labor camp bordering Mill creek for a public park. The county is negotiating for purchase from the U. S. government of a large tract of land including barracks opposite Salem airport and land extending back toward the creek.

District construction and supply problems occupied much of Tuesday night's meeting of the Salem school board, which renewed a call for bids on the proposed bus shop and sheds at the senior high school and voted to call for bids for gasoline and oil supplies.

The lone bid on the bus building was not opened. Instead the board removed alternatives from the building plans and limited the project to a shop and a shed for the present 17 buses. Time for bids was extended to Aug. 20 and the buildings and grounds committee empowered to act.

The year's requirements in petroleum products include 7,433 barrels of heating oil, 40,000 gallons of gasoline, 400 gallons of motor oil and 500 pounds of grease.

The board authorized a contract with T. L. Kuhns Co. of Salem for installation of gasoline tank and pumps in connection with the bus shops.

In other action the board authorized \$26,803 expended from the 1946-47 budget for a West Salem school site to be transferred from the postwar construction fund, and placed the bus transportation on a cost basis, at a two cents per student per bus-mile charge, for outside districts, without disturbing the zone method of charges for individual students.

Umatilla Rejects Boundary Growth

UMATILLA, Aug. 12—(AP)—An expansion plan designed to prevent construction of slum areas around Umatilla met defeat at the polls yesterday in this McNary damsite area.

The proposal was to extend city limits to cover an area about a third the size of Portland.

Residents east of town rejected the proposal, 86-0. Those west of town turned it down, 53-2. The two town districts defeated it by 28-26 and 28-24 margins.

Silverton Man Donates Lamb

PENDLETON, Aug. 12—(AP)—Officials of the annual Oregon ram show to be held here Saturday said today that Floyd T. Fox, Silverton sheepman, had donated a yearling Suffolk ram to be auctioned in the sale. Approximately 355 animals are expected for the show and sale, proceeds of which are used for the Oregon Wool Growers auxiliary.

U.S., British Plan Ruhr Coal Step-Up

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12—(AP)—The United States and Britain agreed today to consider all problems directly bearing upon increasing coal production in Germany's Ruhr valley in an effort to fire Europe's recovery.

As the Anglo-American talks got under way, chiefs of both delegations gingerly sidestepped any commitment on possible socialization of the mines, but did not rule out the chance that such an ultimate step, as urged by Britain, would be considered.

The actual throne of Great Britain is not the coronation chair, but the oaken Gothic chair in the House of Lords occupied by the sovereign at the opening of the Parliament.

50 Poisoned at Colorado Prison

CANON CITY, Colo., Aug. 12—(AP)—Fifty officers and inmates were poisoned seriously at the noon meal today at the officers' mess at the state penitentiary.

Warden Roy Best said he was investigating the source of the poison, believed to have been in potato salad. The men, 25 of them guards and 25 inmates working in the mess hall, were stricken about an hour after lunch.

Grandparents Saved As Youth Drowns

GARIBALDI, Aug. 12—(AP)—Fishermen rescued two grandparents from the ocean last night after their trolling boat capsized, but their 16-year-old grandson was carried down with the boat.

Coastguardsmen said the boy, Harold A. Christenson, 16, Sweet Home, might have been trapped below decks. The grandparents were Mr. and Mrs. Charles Christenson.

McClure Asks City Recreation Areas Added

New recreation areas are needed by Salem, Engineer C. A. McClure reported to the city's long-range planning commission Tuesday night in a preliminary digest of his recreational survey undertaken at the behest of Salem organizations which formed the Salem Recreation association.

McClure's report notes that Salem area population is increasing faster than facilities can be made available for a public recreation program and that city parks are not adequate for active recreation. He advises early acquisition of public recreation sites while desirable tracts are available.

Survey Incomplete
When the full survey is completed, it will be submitted to the Salem Recreation association, the commission indicated.

Other highlights of the survey digest issued by McClure:

The school board is willing to conduct recreation programs that can be financed. Legislative authority should permit school districts to levy a tax exclusively for recreation purposes.

YMCA is well equipped but does not have decentralization of facilities necessary for citywide recreation requirements.

Asks Charges Reduced
Reduction or elimination of charges for adult night classes would result in greater interest in such school in for both recreation and education.

Commercial recreation activities cover wide field in Salem, but most of them closed to minors.

About 35 per cent of Salem area population under age 25 and trend is even larger percentage in younger age groups by 1950.

Method of city-school district budgeting for joint playground program now operating does not insure continuing program from year to year.

Four Perish in Midair Crash

MANCHESTER, N. H., Aug. 12—(AP)—Four persons were killed tonight when an army A-26 bomber and an advanced trainer collided in the air and plummeted to the ground in widely separated areas.

A Grenier army air field official said the bomber, carrying three army personnel, was en route from Andrews field, Maryland, and was within one mile of Grenier, its destination, when it collided.

He said the second plane, out of the Bedford army airport on a routine training flight, carried only the pilot.

The planes hit the ground about three miles apart, one of them in a residential section of South Manchester, and the bomber in adjoining Bedford across the Merrimack river near the Manchester Country club.

U.S., Yugoslavia Signs Trade Pact

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Aug. 12—(AP)—British and American negotiators seeking to build up the economy of western Germany have signed a long-range \$100,000,000 trade agreement with Yugoslavia, it was announced tonight.

This was the third agreement which the British and Americans had made in the last month with countries in the Russian sphere of influence—the others being with Czechoslovakia and Finland.

Paraguay Rebels Said Dispersed

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 12—(AP)—A high official Paraguayan source in Buenos Aires said he was notified tonight that insurgent forces had been "destroyed" around Asuncion and that remnants of rebel units were fleeing toward Piquete Cue and Villeta, north of the Paraguayan capital.

The source did not indicate whether the rebel forces mentioned in the message he received from Asuncion constituted the entire rebel army which has surrounded the city during the past several days.

Draft Records Being Moved to New Building

Files of approximately 400,000 men once concerned with selective service are being moved this week to the new Oregon depository of the office of selective service records, created at the death of selective service on March 31, Col. Elmer V. Wooten, state director, announced Tuesday.

The change of offices to the second floor of a warehouse in the center of the block on Court street between Commercial and Liberty streets will not be completed for at least two weeks.

The changeover affects approximately 600 four-drawer files with records of about 300,000 Oregon men, more than one-half of whom Wooten said served in the armed forces, and about 100,000 out-of-staters who were processed in Oregon draft boards.

The new space, now being partitioned, and getting a new ceiling, is in the warehouse used by R. L. Elstrom Co.

Occupancy of the space at 184 N. Commercial st., occupied by the selective service headquarters for four years, has not been decided upon, according to R. B. Boise, administrator of the Breyman estate, owner of the building.

He Ought to Work On the Audience

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Aug. 12—(AP)—Dr. Griffith W. Williams has a new plan to improve actors' and actresses' performances—by hypnosis.

He expects to try out the plan Thursday night when a summer theatre group stages "Papa Is All," a comedy, in the Park Hotel playhouse, Plainfield.

Dr. Williams, associate professor of psychology at Rutgers university and an accomplished hypnotist, plans to place several of the actors in a trance between the first and second acts.
