## No Rest in August for Weary Woman, Who Puts Things Down for Winter

Any woman who labors under the delusion that canning season ends about the middle of the summer and leaves a month or so of comparative leisure—should by now be aware of her mistake.

Canning really becomes a concentrated affair about this time of year, with peaches, plums, apples and pears coming on at about the same time.

Peaches are just about ready, though of course many women who preferred the earlier varieties for canning, are through with them. Elbertas are just about ready and should be checked on this week.

Apples, the earlier varieties, are good put down for winter eating. There are many favored ways of canning them, but here are a few pointers which may help less experienced homemakers.

A little extra water should be added to applesauce when to be canned, because it thickens a bit and we've found it more popular when slightly thinner than for sauce to be eaten immediately.

Last year we dropped apple quarters into a medium syrup, to which a slight amount of yellow coloring was added, (being sure it was not too much, just a tint to make the apples look natural). The apples were cooked in the syrup until barely clear, put into hot sterilized jars and sealed immediately or processed 5 minutes.
