

Recovery in Stocks Slow

NEW YORK, Aug. 12 (AP)—Stocks generally moved into the recovery bracket of today's market but dealings were among the slowest of the past two months and many pivots held to a slim groove.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up .5 of a point at 65.4, widest advance since July 31.

Pleasant profits compilations lifted Western Union "A" 2 points at 22 1/2 and Chrysler 1 1/2 at 58 1/2. General American Transportation was up 1/2 on merger transactions following a raised quarterly. Curtis-Wright "A" packed on 1 at 15 1/2 in the wake of the first dividend this year.

Seasonal Jobs Start to Reduce Unemployment

Employment in Marion county soared during July as seasonal activities absorbed workers, according to a report issued by the Salem office of the state employment service Tuesday.

At the beginning of August an estimated 1,500 were unemployed as compared with 2,000 on July 1. However July's unemployment in the county was 78 per cent higher than during the same period a year ago, according to a report from the state unemployment compensation commission last week. Of the total number of jobless at the beginning of this month, 545 were women and 530 veterans.

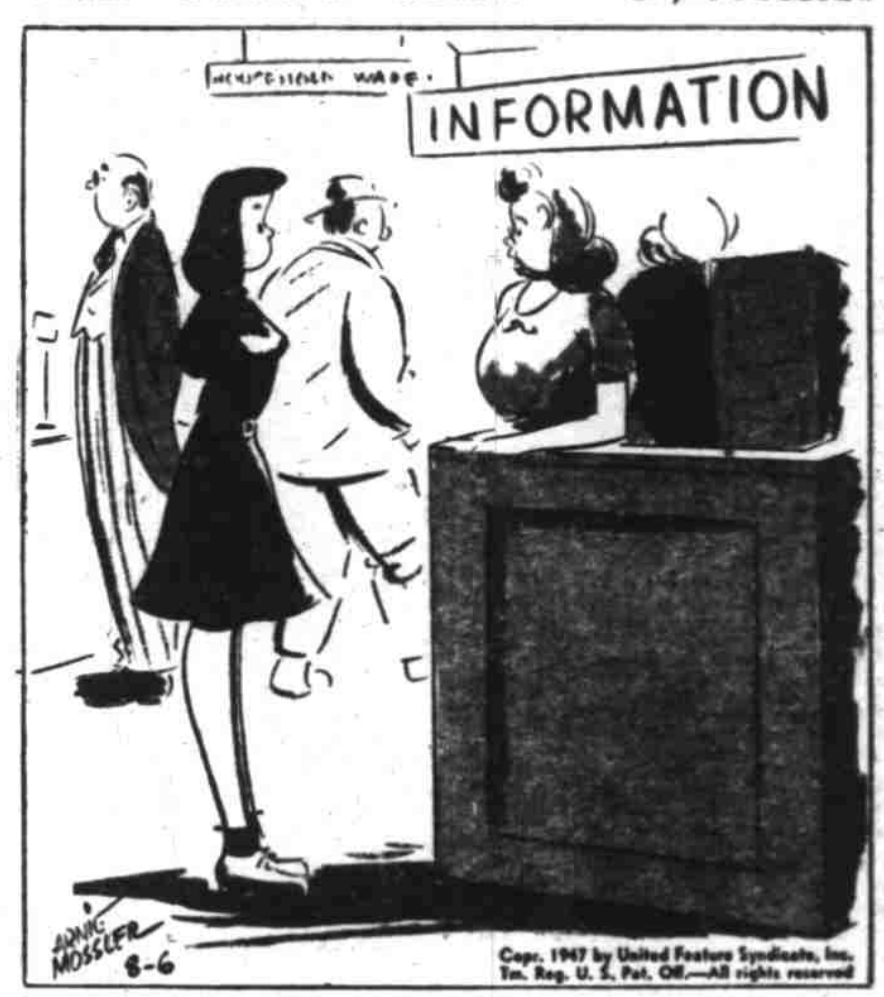
Logging and lumber industries in the county, operating on full production, hired an estimated 1,250 workers. Food processing plants increased their hiring rate and were employing 3,805 workers (1,644 men and 2,151 women) at the end of July. It was predicted that August would see a further rise in cannery employment.

Employment officials reported a shortage of workmen in most building crafts. A total of 242 non-seasonal orders for workers remained unfilled at the office at the beginning of August. Of these, 36 were for domestics and 50 for skilled office workers.

Immigration in this area increased slightly during July when 215 migrants reported into the office as compared with 196 during June.

Outlook for August, as pictured by the office, includes a period of high employment in the Salem area. It is anticipated, however, by employment service officials, that unemployment will be more pronounced later this winter than
