

Teamsters Re-Elect Tobin

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Daniel J. Tobin, greying leader of the AFL teamsters' brotherhood, was unanimously re-elected president today at the closing session of the teamsters' international convention.

Tobin, 61, now begins his 42nd year in office. His nomination was placed before the convention by Dave Beck of Seattle, the man generally expected to assume the newly created post of executive vice president and eventually succeed Tobin. Nine regional vice presidents, including Beck, were also elected.

Soviet, Slavs Seek to Break With Greece

ATHENS, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Neutral diplomatic observers said today that both Russia and Yugoslavia apparently wanted to break off relations with Greece before any communist government was formed along the northern borders.

The observation came as Russia awaited a reply to a protest to the Greek government that Greek authorities had "been arresting and even subjecting to torture persons employed by the soviet embassy" here.

A Tass dispatch from Athens, broadcast by the Russians and intercepted last night by the Soviet Monitor in London, said the Soviet charge d'affaires in the Greek capital had protested that such actions as the Greeks were accused of "were incompatible with the maintenance of diplomatic relations between Greece and the soviet union."

(The dispatch said the arrests and tortures had extended to "other soviet institutions in Greece" in addition to the embassy. It did not make clear, however, whether the persons affected by the alleged actions were soviet citizens, Greeks or persons of some other nationality.)

Final Rites for 32 Marines

SEATTLE, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Puget Sound marine headquarters announced today that memorial services will be held on Mount Rainier August 24 for the 32 marines who crashed to their deaths against the mountain's side last December 10.

A similar service will be held at the San Diego marine base, from which the men started on their ill-fated trip. Wreckage of the plane was found last month near the 10,000-foot level of the mountain. No bodies were recovered. The services will be held near Longmire. Col. W. W. Wensinger, USMC, said the mountain rites were asked by the families of the victims. Both Protestant and Catholic services will be held.

Bradley on Europe Tour

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Gen. Omar N. Bradley, the "doughboy" general of world war 2 who has spent the last two years as head of the veterans administration, sailed for Europe today on a trip whose purpose he said was to "reorient myself into the army."

The general said he would make a "general inspection" of American troops in Germany, Austria and Italy, arriving in the latter country September 9 and spending "three or four days" there.

The war department also announced that Gen. John C. H. Lee, American commander in the Mediterranean and a target of recent criticism, had indicated last February that he would like to return to this country and then retire from active service.

Fighter Dies as Result of Bout
NORTH ADAMS, Mass., Aug. 15.—(AP)—Glenn Newton Smith, 23, Philadelphia middleweight boxer, died early today at North Adams hospital of injuries suffered last night in a bout with Sam Baroudi of Akron, O.

Dr. Arthur Burckel, Meadowbrook Bowl club physician and associate medical examiner, said Smith, who was knocked out in the ninth round of a scheduled 10-round bout, apparently died of a cerebral hemorrhage caused by a blow to the base of the skull.

Burma 'Army' Men Poisoned

RANGOON, Burma, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Eleven high-ranking officers of the people's volunteer organization, "private army" of the anti-fascist people's freedom league, were victims of poisoning at a dinner party last night, Burmese officials announced today. The Burmese government made no comment on the incident, which officials said they believed was the result of accidental food poisoning. It was stated authoritatively, however, that the possibility of an attempted mass poisoning should not be ruled out. The men are all reported recovering.

Eight of the victims are members of the Burmese constituent assembly. The league is Burma's strongest political party and frequently has collided with communists and members of other parties who have claimed it was pro-British. Its former leader, Gen. U Aung San, and six other Burmese government ministers were assassinated July 9.

Arab Woman, Children Slain In Holy Land
TEL AVIV, Palestine, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Eleven Arabs, including a woman and four children, were killed in Palestine's new racial war today as the organized Jewish underground struck back at what it called "Arab brigandage" in the Holy Land.

The Arabs were killed in a bomb and machinegun attack on a two-story stone and steel house in an orange grove near Petah Tikvah, which Hagana, illegal Jewish defense organization, called the "headquarters for Arab brigandage." Hagana announced it had "executed" seven Arab "brigands" in an effort to forestall an Arab "D-day."

Among the dead were the wife and four children and two grown sons of the man Hagana said was the "brigand" leader. Along with other incidents today, the action brought Palestine's six-day racial war toll to 31 dead, 107 injured and property losses of more than \$1,000,000.

'Cease Fire' Order in Java Said Mockery

GAROKET, West Java, Aug. 15.—(AP)—The cease-fire order issued by the Dutch and Indonesians in the East Indies is a mockery here in the front lines.

More men are dying now than when the war was officially on, say soldiers and officers who are doing the actual fighting.

The cease-fire order had been broadcast over the Jogjakarta radio, said today the Dutch had dropped parachute troops south of Garoket, in south-central Java, in violation of the cease-fire order.

heralded as the United Nations security council's first great victory for peace.

The "cessation of hostilities" on both sides really was not that at all.

For the Dutch, the cease-fire in reality meant there would be no drive on the Indonesian capital of Jogjakarta nor on this small chunk of central Java still held by the republicans. Elsewhere, they are continuing to move forward in the rich areas they officially term "occupied."

Pouring down from Cheribon and east from Bandoeng, they have achieved a tenuous hold on more than 366 square miles of southwest Java since the cease-fire order. Reports say similar moves are being made in east Java.

While cut off, these areas never were occupied at the time of the cease-fire order. The Indonesians, who after the first cease-fire order announced later they too planned "mopping up and protective" activities, now seem to be pushing just as hard and in just the way their staff officers in Jogjakarta outlined months ago.

Crowd Protests Entry of Negroes In Housing Colony

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—(AP)—One thousand policemen turned back a crowd of almost 3,000 persons gathered at the Fernwood housing project on the south side, where the admission of several negro families provoked demonstrations which resulted in arrests of 18 persons.

Three patrol wagons of persons, mostly teen age boys, were seized and taken to a south side police station. Police said they had been using abusive language and carried stones.

U.N. Holds Red A-Control Plan 'Not Adequate'

LAKE SUCCESS, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Ten United Nations atomic delegates approved today a Canadian resolution holding that the present Russian plan for an international atomic control commission is not "adequate."

They stressed repeatedly, however, that they had not rejected the Russian proposals. A way was left open for further discussion whenever, as some delegates pointed out, the Russians cared to elaborate on their ideas.

In the face of a declaration from Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet delegate, that adoption of the Canadian resolution would make "more difficult" the task of reaching agreement, the United States and nine other delegations voted for it.

The action left the way open for the commission to start work on its second report to the security council which is due by September 15.

TO SEEK MAGNETIC POLE
EDMONTON, Alta., Aug. 15.—(AP)—Dr. J. L. Robinson, dominion geographic surveyor, said today he and other officials would attempt to explore the interior of Prince of Wales island in the Canadian arctic to establish a definite location for the magnetic pole.

Torture Gets 'Confessions' In Romania

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—The state department, in a new denunciation of communist strong-arm tactics in eastern Europe, charged the Romanian government today with subjecting opposition political leaders to "third degree" tortures.

The apparent purpose of the torture was said to be to extort "confessions" for use in their forthcoming trials on charges they plotted to overthrow Romania's communist-run regime.

A department statement said the "third degree" methods had been reported by Roy M. Melbourne, United States political representative at Bucharest. Officials stressed there is voluminous other information to support the charge that hundreds of peasant party and other opposition leaders jailed in a roundup of communist foes were mistreated.

This development followed two formal American protests against suppression of civil liberties in Romania as a violation of the new peace treaties, and other protests against communist tactics in Bulgaria and Hungary.
