

Increase in September Welfare Program for County Approved

A September budget for Marion county welfare work 17 per cent higher than July's expense and 14 per cent above the August estimate was approved Monday when the county welfare commission conducted its monthly meeting in the welfare offices at 475 N. Church st.

Welfare Administrator Marion Bowen told commissioners the increase to \$93,870 from July actual expenditure of \$80,372 and the August budget at \$82,378 was due almost entirely to the state welfare commission's recent reinstatement of \$5 clothing allowance where clothing need could be shown by recipients of welfare grants.

Combined sources for the September budget funds are \$15,476 in county funds, \$39,082 in federal allocation and \$40,311 in state funds.

Miss Bowen also noted the restoration of several grants as aid to dependent children after three months during which seasonal harvest work provided employment for the families involved. She estimated that about \$4,000 was saved during July and August after welfare workers encouraged such employment.

Reinstatement of this part of the aid to dependent children, however, did not account for much of the September budget increase, the administrator pointed out, because the added requirement was approximately balanced by the cancellation of some 40 cases of old age assistance because of deaths.

The commission was notified that during September the welfare case records of this county will undergo two inspections, one by federal social security board representatives and the other by inspectors for a state legislature interim committee.

Miss Bowen's financial report showed the July expenditure of \$80,372 for welfare broken into \$56,492 for 1,536 old age assistance cases, \$9,181 for aid to 284 dependent children in 109 families, \$8,000 for 166 general assistance cases involving 395 persons, \$27 for 19 blind cases and \$5,892 for administration.

Salem Area Harvest Work Orders Heavy

With seasonal harvests driving to a peak this week, Marion county's farm labor demand is rapidly increasing, according to a report issued Monday by the Salem farm labor office.

On tap at the office are "urgent" orders for 100 bean, 300 hop, 250 peach and prune pickers. Family groups are preferred and transportation is furnished at the office each morning. Drive-outs may phone the office to be directed to a field near their homes.

Current wages paid are 2 1/2 cents per pound for beans, 3 1/2 cents for hops, an average of 25 cents per box for prunes (or 35 cents if the picker shakes the trees), and 75 cents per hour for peaches. Most yards have camping facilities.

The prune crop, a full two weeks earlier than last year, is beginning this week. Beans are reaching their peak, peaches have moved into the late varieties and hops now include the end of early fuggles with late hops expected to open up next Monday, according to Mrs. Gladys Turnbull, farm labor assistant.

Because of the increased need for workers, the office Monday appealed to growers to advise the office's placement desk in advance of picker orders.

Tax Officers Cancel School Board Budget

The state tax commission, because of alleged irregularities, Monday invalidated the school budget of school board 17 embracing the towns of Brookings and Harbor in Curry county. The order was signed by all three members of the commission.

The school board, according to the tax commission, failed to permit taxpayers to discuss the budget at the election meeting as provided in the budget laws and the election notices were published only twice preceding the election instead of not less than 20 days prior to the election. It also contended that names of person eligible to vote were taken from the current tax rolls.

Two meetings were held by the board. At the first meeting on June 16 a budget of \$44,788.11 was defeated by a vote of 87 to 54. At the second meeting on July 17 a revised budget calling for \$56,670.52 or \$11,000 in excess of the first budget was submitted. Protests said they were not permitted to discuss the budget at the second meeting.

The school board was enjoined by the tax commission from extending the proposed school levy on the tax rolls even though it was approved by the voters. Only part of the district's budget found valid was \$10,000 serial levy previously voted.

Need of High Economy for All Stressed by Farm Union Leader

American economy must be maintained at a high enough level to furnish jobs for everyone at a high enough wage to enable the people to buy the farm produce, if the family-type farmer is to exist, Glenn Talbot, president of the North Dakota Farmers union and chairman of the national executive committee of the Farmers union, told 800 people at the annual summer picnic of the Oregon Farmers union Sunday at Champoug.

He was introduced by Ronald Jones, Brooks, president of the state group.

"I like to pay good wages to the help on my farm when everyone else is paying good wages," said Talbot. "We used to think of the grain elevators, the creameries, the canneries as our markets. This is wrong. The farmers' market is the 140 million stomachs. And if the owners of these stomachs don't make enough to fill them the farmer is sunk."

Talbot also said that "we farmers used to think only of getting a high price for our products. We organized only selling cooperatives. But we have learned that it isn't the high price we get for our produce that is the important thing, but the relation between the cost and the market price."

He urged farmers to build up cooperatives to eliminate "the un-

U.S. Requests Reds to Stop Bulgar Plan

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 - (AP) - The United States pressed its campaign of protest against communist tactics in the Balkans today by appealing to Russia to halt Bulgaria's execution of Nikola Petkov, outspoken Bulgarian opposition leader.

With British support, the American representative on the three-power allied control commission for occupied Bulgaria charged that Petkov's conviction in Sofia Saturday of "plotting" against the communist fatherland front government was a "miscarriage of justice" which might have "repercussions on peace and order" in a country for which the commission is supervisory authority.

State Senator Lee Patterson, Portland, Dies

PORTLAND, Aug. 18 - (AP) - A heart attack claimed the life of State Sen. Lee Patterson, 57, yesterday at his summer home near Mt. Hood.

The son of the late governor, Isaac L. Patterson, he became a Multnomah county legislator in 1943. He was chairman of the senate military affairs committee in the last session.

Patterson, a native of Salem, attended schools there and Stanford university. He was a veteran of World War I. In June, 1921, he married Bertha Masters. They had no children.

A mining engineer and real estate appraiser, he also had served as a director of the Oregon Mutual Trust and Savings bank since August, 1945. During the war he was associated with the Willamette Iron and Steel company.

Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

New Pudding River Project District Boundaries Fixed

WOODBURN, Aug. 18 - A committee meeting at the office of the North Marion Fruit company tonight decided on a 1 1/2 mile boundary to be used in the forming of a Pudding river project district.

This boundary is to extend from the mouth of the Pudding river to the 47-mile mark to conform to recent legislation enacted by the state legislature in senate bill 370 and to secure rights-of-way for the river channel clearance, for which congress recently appropriated \$110,000.

A law recently enacted by the state legislature authorizes estab-

lishment of water control districts by property owners through the county courts to conserve water resources, control floods, improve agricultural lands and to benefit the public and empowers nine elected directors to administer the district, levy ad valorem taxes and form assessment sub-districts.

The committee at the meeting authorized that petitions be drawn up to circulate to property owners within the 1 1/2 mile boundary, and to appoint an attorney to handle the legal procedure following the signing of petitions. Another meeting will be called after petitions are received.

Committee members attending the meeting tonight were George Cline, chairman, North Howell; John Ramage, Woodburn; R. A. Ginner, North Howell; T. J. Anderson and L. L. Palmateer, both of Aurora; and Oscar Strand, Silverton. Assisting at the meeting were Ted Hobart, Ladd and Bush bank field representative, Salem and Ivan Oakes, executive secretary of the Willamette River Basin commission.

Russians Veto U.N. Admission Of 3 Countries

LAKE SUCCESS, Aug. 18 - (AP) - The soviet union cast its 12th, 13th and 14th vetoes in the security council late today to reject applications from Ireland, Portugal and Transjordan for membership in the United Nations.

The council also rejected soviet-supported Albania and Outer Mongolia. It then voted unanimously to recommend the admission of the Arab kingdom of Yemen and the new dominion of Pakistan. The two Moslem states will become the 56th and 57th members when given routine sanction by the general assembly meeting in New York Sept. 16.

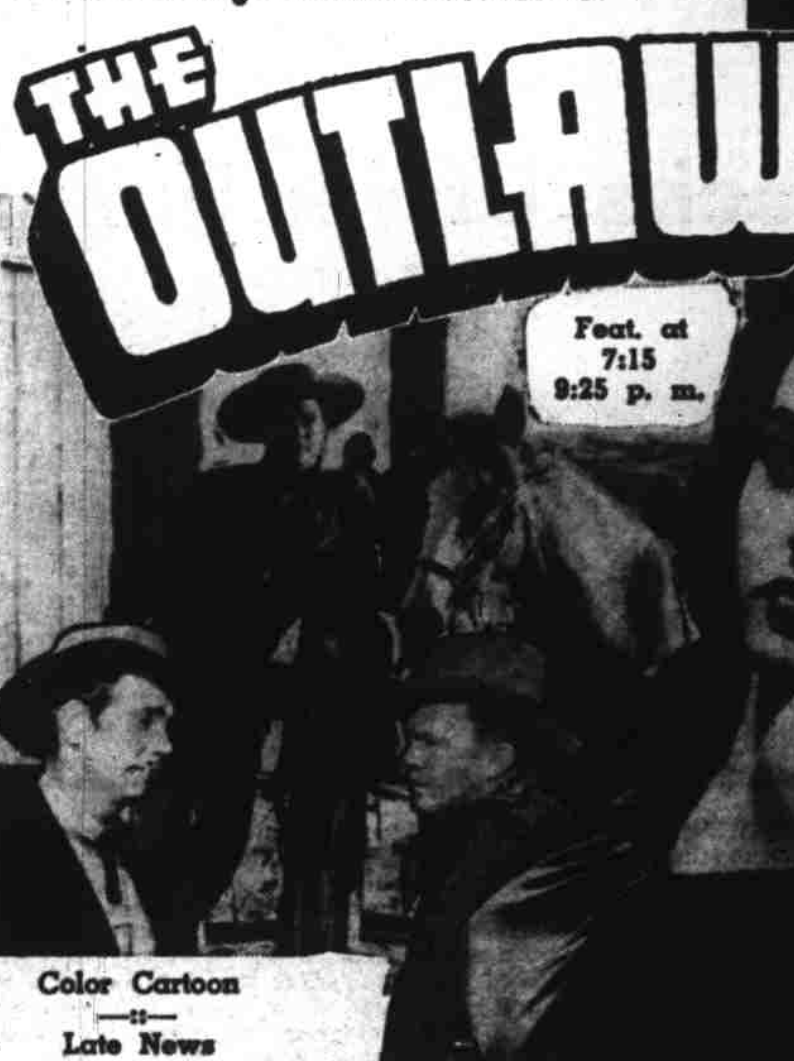
