ALBANY, Aug. 23—(Special)—Armina Belle Edwards, a resident of Salem for 16 years prior to moving to Albany in 1939, died of a heart attack at the home of her son in the latter city Saturday. Funeral services will be held at the Fisher funeral home in Albany at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, August 26, with concluding services at Belcrest Memorial park in Salem at 3:30 p.m.

Born in Clarinda, Iowa, July 1, 1870, she moved to Salem with her husband in 1923 and was a member of the Salem First Baptist church. Her husband preceded her in death in April, 1939, and she moved to Albany where her sons operate the Sears planing mill.

Survivors include four sons, Martin B. Edwards, O. E. Edwards, and W. R. Edwards, all of Albany; two daughters, Mrs. Lola Zink, Salem, and Mrs. Mabel Reichley, Jersey Shore, Penn.; two brothers, Vern Blair, Ontario, Ore., and Dr. Fred Blair, Los Angeles; also 13 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

Mt. Rainier Yields 14 More Bodies

SEATTLE, Aug. 23—(AP)—Finding of an additional 14 marines' bodies on Mount Rainier was reported by the navy tonight as a survey party of expert mountaineers prepared to climb to the area to determine whether the bodies of the victims last December's marine corps plane could be brought down hazardous South Tahoma glacier.

The new discoveries, made by a mountain party yesterday, brought to 25 the number of bodies sighted. Thirty-two were on the plane.

Here for his first visit to the sprawling plant since his appointment to his commission, Lilienthal said at the same time that Hanford's future was assured as "the world's only manufacturing plant of plutonium."
