A drive to recruit 88,888 men for the U.S. national guard this fall was announced Saturday by Brig. Gen. Raymond F. Olson, acting adjutant general, of the Oregon national guard. Oregon's quota in the drive will be 1590 officers and men, Gen. Olson said. A recruiting contest open only to enlisted men now in the national guard, paying off with a ticket to this fall's Army-Navy football game will feature the recruiting drive, with each state to send its champion recruit to the game.
