Schools Find .Difficulty in **Filling Staffs**

The school teacher situation in Oregon, while slightly improved over a year ago, still is acute with indications that many school districts will have difficulty in filling their teacher staffs, D. A. Emerson, state educational de-partment, noted Monday. A large number of schools, particularly those in the larger towns and cities, already have opened for the fall and winter terms.

Emerson predicted that the number of emergency teaching certificates, around 2,500 last year, will be increased to 3,000 in 1947. These certificates are issped under a legislative enactment sought by the state educational department early in the war.

The slight improvement in the teacher situation this year was attributed by Emerson to an influx of instructors from the eastern and middle-western states.






