

Community Property Law Aspects Told

A few aspects of the new community property law in Oregon were discussed by Wesley Stewart, vice-president of Salem Title Co., and Utin S. Page, president of Union Title Co., at Friday's luncheon of the Salem Board of Realtors in the Marion hotel.

Page said a conveyance of prop-

erty to husband and wife is now presumed to be in the nature of community property unless otherwise indicated. The owners' choice in such matters must be theirs and their attorney's, he reminded, as title companies cannot give such legal advice. He noted some changes necessary in deeds as a result of the law passed by the 1947 state legislature.

A "statement of identity" used by title companies as a prerequisite to issuance of title insurance was discussed by Stewart. He urged that it be considered not as an invasion of personal information but as a means of securing data necessary to avoid many disputes.

The board has cancelled next Friday's luncheon because of the annual state realtors' convention in Gearhart next week.

Acid Damage Costs Sought By Linen Firm

Suit to recover \$4,276.93 damages allegedly caused last June 11 when a carboy of sulphuric acid burst, allowing the acid to damage warehouse and stock at Miles Linen Co. mill here, was filed in Marion county circuit court Friday by the Miles firm against two suppliers and two transfer companies.

Defendants are Van Waters and Rogers, Inc., and Stauffer Chemical Co., both supply houses, and R. R. Bailey, doing business as Willamette Valley Transfer Co., and St. Johns Motor Express Co., firms who handled delivery of the acid.

The complaint alleges negligence in packaging and handling of the acid, which soaked through the warehouse floor, necessitating its replacement, and damaged, according to the complaint, 1,213 pounds of twine, 384 pounds of hatched flax, 1,050 pounds of boiled yarn and a quantity of cartons.

Dog Bites Girl's Face, Mouth; Stitches Taken

A 12-year-old Salem girl suffered a dog bite Thursday that required 25 stitches to close about the mouth and face.

She is Le Anne Munding, daughter of Police Sgt. and Mrs. Ersel R. Munding who reported Friday that the girl seems to be recovering from the effects of the bite, but can take nourishment only through a tube. Le Anne also was clowned on the right leg.

The incident occurred Thursday when Munding and his daughter visited friends, the Cloyce Drake family, at 1912 N. Fifth st. As the girl was playing with other children in the yard the Drakes' dog, an Australian shepherd, lunged at her and bit her mouth, Sgt. Munding reported. The dog was chained at the time.

The dog has been taken to the city pound for 10 days' observation for possible presence of rabies, then will be destroyed, according to Munding.

3 Nurses Aid In Polio Area

Marion county has sent three nurses to aid in the care of polio patients in Boise, Idaho, hospitals, reports Mrs. Louise Arneson, nursing director for Marion county chapter, American Red Cross. The local Red Cross was asked to recruit nurses who would be willing to go to work in the epidemic.
