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A Serious Sport

One of the favorite recourses of the little people throughout the world when they get mad at the big people is to take pot shots at embassy windows.

Already bills for new panes are winging from Cairo and Colombia to the U. S. treasury department, and except for poor marksmanship another such message might be on its way from Pakistan.

Such incidents might be more easily passed off if they carried with them the cries "Down with capitalism" or "hurrah for communism," which we become accustomed to associate with harranguing mobs, but in the aforementioned cases the shouting was more specific in its denunciation.

In Colombia the crowds protested U. S. "imperialism." The United States had retrenched, asking termination of certain wartime privileges extended to a merchant fleet owned by Colombia, Venezuela and Ecuador.

In Egypt the cries concerned the failure of the United States to support the Egyptians in their appeal to the United Nations to remove British troops from the Nile basin.

In Pakistan it was simply: "We can't stand to see Americans living in luxury while millions of our own people starve."

At least it is increasingly apparent that to live in a glass house of prosperous economic islandry it is necessary for a nation not only to restrain the urge to throw stones, but to keep one's neighbors in the same frame of mind.

The Public Interest Was Served

Newspapers, which have long trod the tight-rope between legitimate news and the post office department's prohibition of all mention of lotteries, will welcome the department's new interpretation of postal laws.

Not that newspapers won't still be subject to fines and being barred from the mails if they publicize lotteries, raffles, etc. But under the new ruling they will be permitted to mention such activities if they are referred to only incidentally in connection with a "newsworthy event."

The change—it can hardly be called a relaxation of the fundamental principle—resulted from publication of recent stories from Georgia regarding a negro who held a winning lottery ticket but who was denied the prize because of his race.

Every newspaper in the nation reported the event, with the healthy result that public opinion forced the lottery's sponsors to have a change of heart. But in St. Louis the postmaster objected to the Star-Times' publicizing of the story and thus brought the matter to a head.

The Star-Times and other newspapers were cleared this week when Solicitor Frank J. Delany declared that "the law was not intended to exclude from the mails publication of such items . . . which have a news value in their own right and in which the lottery element is only incidental to a newsworthy event."

We can hope there are few such cases in which outright discrimination figures, however.

He Did Wrong, But—

We don't mean to condone disobedience of the law but we can't help saying a good word for A. C. Phillips of Fresno, Calif., whose record now is blighted by a note on the police blotter.

Phillips apparently once was a boy, as is the case with most male humans even though some forget about it, and as a boy he must have learned the basic art of fishing. His name got on the police blotter because, it was charged, he bent a pin to the proper shape, acquired a length of string, cut himself a willow stick, and proceeded to go after some big spawners who relied too heavily on the fact that their home was a closed stream.

Closed; not closed, and fish or no fish, Phillips must have had himself some fun and we still wonder whether he would have been fined \$10 had the name of the judge been less female than Mary.

The Salem area can well be proud that three of its nurses have answered the appeal of Idaho authorities for help in connection with the polio epidemic. The volunteers are to be highly commended for their sense of duty and the Marion county Red Cross has done a good service in obtaining them for the stricken area.

So far as New England is concerned, some semblance of normalcy appears to have been reached—the east coast's famed sea serpent again has been reported seen after an unexplained absence of 10 years.

Ike Eisenhower may or may not have escaped a political campaign by declaring he would be no party to an "artificial" draft for the presidency, but as yet Calvin Coolidge's "I do not choose to run" holds the record for a variety of interpretations.

Eugene is a bit upset because a circus by-passed that city without notice, after previously scheduling an appearance there. With school opening, however, the circus' change of heart undoubtedly saved a lot of wear and tear on truant officers.

NO MYSTERIES IN INFLATION

Eugene housewives complain that prices, particularly food prices, skyrocketed so fast that many have given up budgeting in favor of simply going without. That is one of the swiftest and most effective cures for inflation. However, we haven't seen many literally "going without"—except a few caught in the bite of very low wages or very low fixed income.

When the housewife speaks of "going without," she probably means that she stretches a soupbone instead of tossing out porterhouse steaks, or that she is doing over Suzie's old dress instead of telling her to charge Paw with three new ones. But in good times or bad there always were the smart people who know how to make money stretch.

What's causing all this inflation? No, not the communists! The inflation is strictly "made in the USA." Nor can you pin the blame to the politicians, or the labor unions, or the big industrialists, or to Wall street, or any other single group.

After every great war, there is inflation! That can be shown on charts going back to the American revolution. Why? Because during a war, commodities are scarce and labor is scarce, and there is a severe disruption of the normal relations between demand and production. We came out of World War II with "billions of pent up buying power" and production all out of gear for peacetime needs. But, inflation, we submit, is more "a state of mind" than of economic mathematics.

"What about the planned economy experts?" They might have something, if they knew what to do, and when and how much to do it. But for our times, the soupbone-stretching housewife is a much more potent force. (Eugene Register-Guard.)

Construction Workmen Still Scarce Here

As employment in Marion county reaches its peak, demand for building trades workmen is easily ahead of the supply, according to a report Friday from the Salem office of the state employment service.

While building permits issued during August climbed, construction work more than used up the available supply of building workmen; the report indicated. Workmen shortages included 50 carpenters, 10 electricians, 12 plumbers, 10 cement finishers and 12 plasterers.

The office started September off with 333 non-seasonal orders for workers remaining unfilled. Of these 34 were for domestics, 180 for skilled trade and service industries and 75 for construction workers.

With logging and lumbering and food processing plants running at full capacity during August, a peak 10,186 county residents were working. The year's low of only 750 jobless was also reached, the office reported. Although classified as unemployed, the office pointed out that many were only technically so, as most were unemployed for limited periods or were self-employed.

The office predicts continued activity on all work fronts for the next few weeks, but looks for a fall-off in employment as winter approaches. Although logging and construction jobs are expected to continue late in the year, the first blow to job-holders will come through layoffs in food processing and in general among the unskilled and partially skilled trades, the report indicated.

Vets Reminded Of Free Dental Clinic Here

Ex-GI's of the Salem area were reminded Friday by Dr. A. R. Schoenberg, director of the veterans administration dental clinic, that they may receive free treatment for tooth troubles that started or were aggravated in service.

Since the addition of Dr. F. E. Manbeck to the VA staff, two dentists are on duty at the clinic, 120 S. Liberty st., Dr. Schoenberg stated.

Nearly 180 veterans have received examinations during the past two months and 74 have received emergency treatments, he pointed out. In non-emergency cases, the free treatment is not given until extent of the veteran's eligibility is determined from records sent to the Portland regional office.

A large percentage of veterans can present sufficient proof of service-connection, Dr. Schoenberg explained. Most dental ailments are considered eligible within the first year after discharge. A veteran's army or navy medical record are always the best proof, but a private dentist's affidavit that treatment was necessary within the first year is also accepted, he said.
