Willamette U's 1947 Bearcats open their nine game schedule Friday night with the College of the Pacific Tigers at Stockton, Cal. Waldorf Makes Coast Debut Impressive One

BERKELEY, CALIF., Sept. 20 (AP)—Grinding out touchdowns with a display of new found power, Coach Lynn Waldorf's University of California Bears opened their 1947 football season today with a 33-7 victory over University of Santa Clara.

A crowd of 45,000 watched the Broncos to a 7-6 lead in the first period but crumpled thereafter before the superior power and charge of a California team re-empowered since last year's disastrous season of seven defeats and two wins.

In the first 55 seconds of play, after Santa Clara lost the ball on two out of bounds kickoffs, George Fong, Bear right half, ran 30 yards to score.

In the same period, a recovered fumble on the California 43 paved the way for Bronco half Paul Haynes to bore over from the two. Santa Clara converted for a 7-6 lead.

After all it was all California.

Leicht Paces Final Period Drive To Overcome Early Visitor Lead

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 20 (AP)—A stout Montana State team wilted in the final period here today and Oregon rushed over three late touchdowns to snatch a 27-14 victory for Coach Jim Aiken and his debut before 11,500 shirt-sleeved fans.

The victors trailed, 14-6, as the final period opened and the first upset of the season on the west coast appeared in the books until Oregon suddenly found new power.

In the first five minutes of the fourth quarter, however, fleet halfback Jake Leicht scored twice, once on a 26-yard run, and again on a 6-yard sweep. Later, his replacement, Bob Oas, added a third touchdown on a short plunge. Halfback Jim Newquist kicked all three conversion attempts.

Oregon took a 6-0 lead in the first two minutes on an 11-yard pass from Quarterback Norm Van Brocklin to End Dan Garza, but for two periods thereafter the Bobcats forced the play.

Quarterback Gene Bourdet connected repeatedly on passes, tossing one to End Ken Card for a touchdown in the second quarter and another to End Harry Ferrigo for another in the third period. George Rumberger kicked both points after touchdown.

But the Bobcats were completely unable to get going against the late Oregon power and did not get beyond midfield in the final period.

Red Birds Top Cubs as Dodgers Lose to Braves; Mize Homers

The St. Louis Cardinals clung desperately to precariously slim chance in the National pennant race yesterday as they whipped the Chicago Cubs, 5-0, while the Brooklyn Dodgers again were kept from a "clinch" as they bowed to the Boston Braves, 8-1.

Big George Munger let the Cubs down with three hits to notch his 15th victory and shove off almost certain pennant elimination for another day. The Dodgers, needing a win or a Red Bird loss to assure themselves of the flag, were hog-tied by the Braves' Johnny Sain who threw a six-hit shutout at them to chalk up his 20th win. The New York Giants stopped the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-3, as Johnny Mize socked his 50th homer.

In the American loop the Philadelphia Athletics lipped the New York Yankees, 3-2, to remain a strong contender for a first division berth. Dick Fowler bested Buck Newsom in a hurling duel, giving up seven blows. The Boston Red Sox held to their slim second-place margin by splitting two with Washington, the Solons taking the opener, 6-3, and the Sox coming back with a 7-2 win. Detroit beat Cleveland and Bob Feller, 3-2, in 10 innings, and a scheduled second game was called in the ninth because of darkness with the count, 5-5. The St. Louis Browns topped the Chicago White Sox, 5-3.
