



New Law Effective Mr. Kellstedt reminds the farmers of the new ruling provided by the 1947 legislative amendment to the Oregon forest conservation act. The new requirements go into effect January 1, 1948. Anyone, including farmers, who cut timber for any commercial purpose after that date must have a permit.
