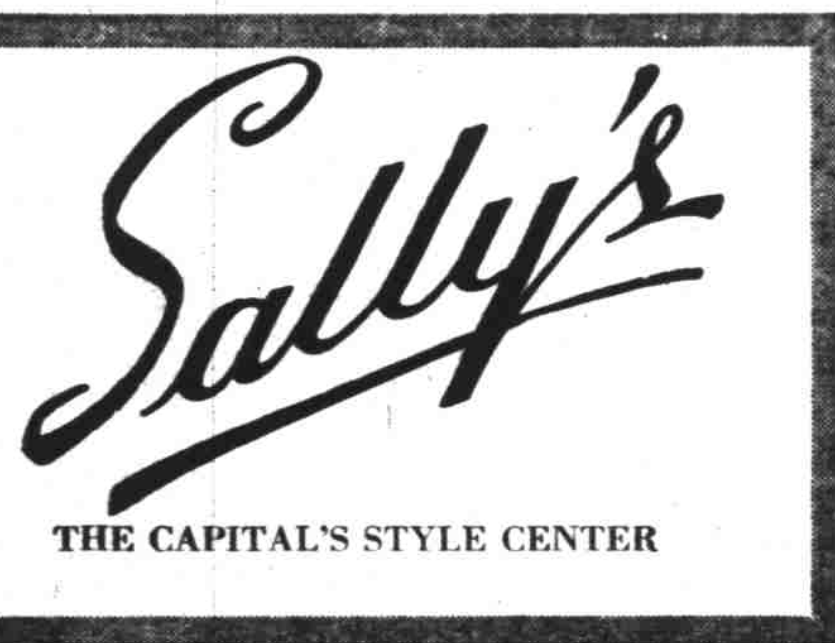
## Sorority Group Elects Tuesday

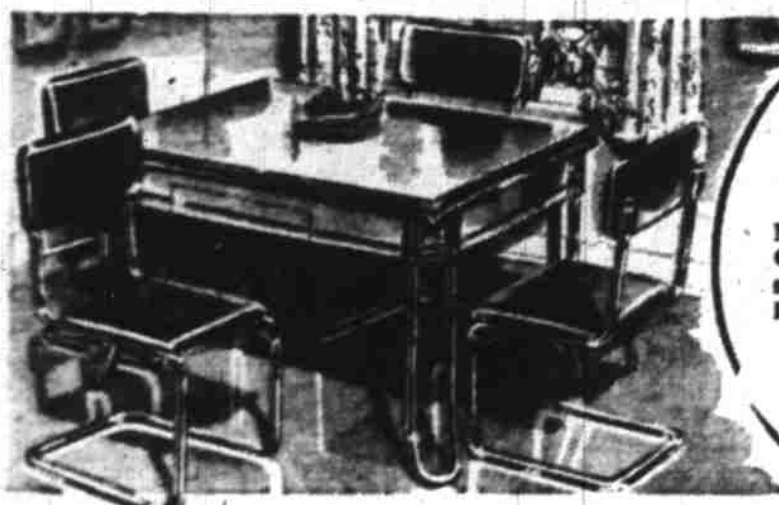

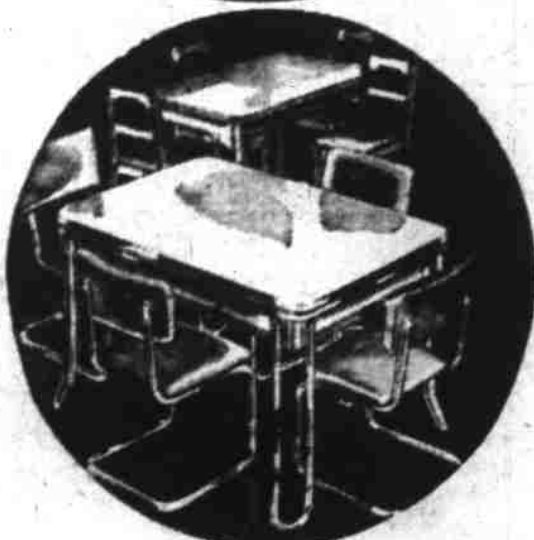
