

Food Plea Gets Quick Reply; Opinions of Oregon Interests Vary but Cooperation Essential

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—President Truman's appeal for less food consumption drew quick reaction today.

Restaurant owners gave assurance that they are cutting waste and will feature well-prepared but less costly foods. Distilleries, brewers and meat producers began working out the details toward a goal of using less grain for alcoholic beverages and for fattening cattle. Poultry and egg dealers pledged cooperation "to the fullest extent."

Senator Bridges (R-N.H.), chairman of the senate appropriations committee, said he expects President Truman to summon congress into special session Dec. 1 for emergency action on Europe's food problems. And CIO President Philip Murray, a member of the president's food committee, echoed the call for a special session along with an appeal for congress to re-enact price controls.

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Oregon poultrymen and distributors declared today that they "don't eat poultry on Thursday" plan to help Europe at all. They argued that storage facilities are already packed with unused poultry, and a new crop is coming in.

Noel Bennison, Oregon State college extension official, said it appeared too late to save much feed this year.

C. W. Norton, president of a northwest poultry and dairy products company, declared that curbing appetites at home would be "senseless" as long as the government continues refusing poultry for export.

But the Oregon Bakers asso-

ciation said it was already at work on a bread-saving drive. The Oregon Restaurant association's executive secretary, Ransom Meinke, said his group would cooperate on "meatless days."

SEATTLE, Oct. 6.—(AP)—A decision to comply "100 per cent with President Truman's appeal for meatless Tuesdays and eggless Thursdays was announced late today by the policy committee of the Washington State Restaurant association.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) said tonight he "thoroughly" approved of President Truman's program for reduction in consumption of food.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Mark Clark today ordered sharp reductions in consumption of bread, meat, alimentary pastes, butter and other fats throughout the Sixth army.

Clark's orders said potatoes and rice would be substituted for other cereals. One day each week will be meatless and on another no poultry or eggs will be served.

Precincts Listed For West Salem

WEST SALEM, Oct. 6.—Voters in the special election Tuesday will vote in one of the three West Salem precincts. Number 1 voted in the school house, number 2 at the city hall, and number 3 in the American Legion hall.

Schools Told To Cooperate With Public

If the schools are to receive the support to which they are entitled, the general public must be kept adequately informed as to educational problems and efforts being made to cope with them, Dr. Virgil Rogers, city school superintendent of Battle Creek, Mich., told Oregon school administrators at their four-day annual conference opened here Monday.

Rogers said this cooperation particularly was essential in the approaching battle for the tax dollar.

While stressing that he did not come to Oregon to discuss politics Rogers said this state needs a sales tax. "Communism is not the topic uppermost in the minds of the public," Rogers continued. "Our principal worries apparently center about inflation and getting along with other nations."

The annual dinner was held Monday night with Joe Chandler, executive secretary of the Washington Education Association, the principal speaker.

Variance in Milk Prices Non-Essential

Milk sold in paper containers need not bring a higher price than milk sold in glass bottles, according to a decision handed down Monday by Marion County Circuit Judge George R. Duncan.

Judge Duncan's opinion came at the end of a series of briefs in a suit filed by Sunshine Dairy of Portland against E. L. Peterson, director of the state department of agriculture. The suit asked the court to declare invalid a 1945 order of Peterson's declaring that all milk sold in the Portland sales area in pint and quart fibre or paper containers be sold at a price of one cent above the price for milk in glass containers.

Holding that the question of determination "is whether or not the legislature has authorized the director to require a higher price based solely on the type of container," Judge Duncan ruled that Peterson did not have that authority.

The suit was filed in April, 1946, and as such applies only to Multnomah county.

Salem's Tiny Babies Doing 'Just Fine'

All four of Salem's "mighty mites"—unusually small babies born in local hospital during August and September—were doing "just fine" Monday night, hospital officials reported.

Susan Carol Cross, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Cross, route 2, Salem, who weighed just 23 ounces when she was born in Salem General hospital, September 19, is the smallest "champion." Hospital authorities said she was gaining every day.

Runners up to the "champion" is Bonnie Dean Christensen, who weighed 2 pounds 2 ounces when she was born at Salem Deaconess hospital August 30. She is gaining every day, too, it was reported.

Perhaps a little on the heavier side, though they couldn't be weighed at birth, are twin boys, Robert Hunt and William Arthur Spindler, born at Deaconess on September 18. They are still in the hospital, but doing very nicely, nurses said. Their birth weights were guessed at about two pounds plus each.

Eisler Freed On Bail After Surrendering

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Hanns Eisler, film song writer, and his wife, Louise—accused by the house unAmerican committee—surrendered today on warrants calling for deportation proceedings, but won quick release on bond.

Warrants were issued in Washington by the immigration service. In Washington, the justice department said that Mr. and Mrs. Eisler were picked up on charges that he is an alien holding membership in an organization advocating the violent overthrow of the U. S. government, and that Mrs. Eisler "was not a non-quota immigrant as specified in her visa" at the time of their entry in this country. Non-quota immigrants are those originating in the western hemisphere.

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Menu Set for 'New Deal' at White House

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Cheese souffle for lunch and broiled salmon steak for dinner are on President Truman's menu at the White House tomorrow—the first "meatless Tuesday" of his campaign to save food for Europe.

And on the first Thursday on the "no poultry or eggs" basis, his luncheon and dinner menus go right along.

A White House statement said that for the first Tuesday of "self-denial," Mr. Truman will be served grapefruit for luncheon plus cheese souffle, buttered peas, grilled tomatoes and chocolate pudding.

The menu for tomorrow night's dinner is clear chicken soup, salmon steak with scalloped potatoes, string beans, sautéed eggplant, perfection salad and sliced peaches.

When the first poultryless-eggless Thursday comes around, the White House cook will turn out corn soup, pepper stuffed with rice and mushrooms, lima beans, glazed carrots, and baked apples for lunch.

For Thursday night's dinner, Mr. Truman gets some melon balls, baked ham, baked sweet potatoes, asparagus and cauliflower. He will taper off with a green salad and "coffee mallow" for dessert.
