**Rossmann Talks To Kiwanis on Bureaucracy**

Expansion of administrative law in the United States from the office and customs division to the present complicated system of federal bureaus was outlined by Chief Justice George Rossmann for the Salem Kiwanis club Tuesday noon in the Marion hotel.

Greatest objection to the administration of law by bureaus cited by the speaker was that no one knew about the law except those passing on it. The Oregon supreme court jurist cited one case in which the ruling had been repealed by the bureau itself unknown to those administering it.

Each federal agency or bureau is created by a separate act of congress, and for the state by a separate act of the legislature. Justice Rossmann said, citing the Oregon industrial accident commission and the state unemployment compensation commission. These boards have identical membership but differing powers because of difference in the wording of the laws establishing them.
