U.S. to Return **Gold to Italy**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 -(AP) A store of gold worth \$28,000,-000, captured by the U. S. Fifth army corps from Germans who had stolen it from the Bank of Italy, was made available to-night to the Italian government. The gold cache was found in May of 1945 at Fortezza, Italy, where the retreating Germans had hidden it. Great Britain and the United States agreed tonight to turn it

over to the non-communist Italian government, providing it with additional assets needed to continue purchases of wheat and fuel during the winter.
