Corn Slumps, Oats Gains in Grain Market

CHICAGO, Oct. 10—(AP)—Grains moved in divergent directions on the board of trade today, corn slumping, wheat closing mixed and oats displaying considerable independent strength. Turnover again was at the moderate level prevailing since margins were hiked.
 Major feature was the drop in corn, which fell around 5 cents at one time. With major distilling companies shutting down for a 60-day emergency holiday and a more optimistic government crop report expected after the close, little sustained buying power developed.
 Wheat closed 1/2 lower to 1 1/4 higher, December \$2.92 1/2-1/2, corn was 1 1/4-2 1/4 higher, December \$2.24 3/4-2.25, and oats were 1/2-3/4 higher, December 1.18 3/4-1.19.
 The government estimate of a corn crop of 2,458,000,000 bushels, up 54,761,000 bushels from the preceding month, was a smaller gain than many analysts had predicted. However, traders pointed out that prospects have continued to improve since October 1, when data for the government report was collected.
 The December wheat contract drew some support from government purchases of 2,169,000 bushels of cash wheat yesterday and at one time moved to a new seasonal high of \$2.94 1/2. However, practically all the gain was lost at the close.
 The five-day weather outlook for the southwest was pessimistic, encouraging some buying of July wheat.

Buyers Stay At Controls of Stock Market

NEW YORK, Oct. 10—(AP)—Buyers remained in control of today's stock market although offerings were sufficient to throw many leaders for moderate losses.
 Floor traders continued to pick up favorites on the idea the list was due for a further strong move if the expected big-scale dollar relief for Europe eventuates and props the wavering export picture. Prospects of expanding earnings and booster dividends aided individual favorites. A couple of nines were trimmed here and there for the lengthy weekend—securities markets will recess Monday in observance of Columbus Day.
 While plus marks held a wide majority at the close, declines were plentiful. Volume reached 1,120,000 shares compared with 790,000 the day before.
 The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up 1 point at 65.5, which was a top since Sept. 2. Of 995 issues registering, 531 rose and 257 fell.
