

Dry Weather Boosts Grains

CHICAGO, Oct. 18 (AP)—More dry weather in the southwest, and a forecast for no rain over the weekend, caused aggressive buying of wheat contracts representing the 1948 crop on the board of trade today. Other wheat deliveries were firm.

Wheat closed 1 1/2-5 1/2 higher, December \$3.00-3.05, corn was 1/4-3/4 higher, December \$2.32 1/2-2, and oats were 1/4-1 1/4 higher, December \$1.20-1.19, November soybeans closed at \$3.39 1/4.

In addition to weather developments, wheat was aided by information that the commodity credit corporation was not withdrawing from the cash market, as had been rumored yesterday.

Announcement of an agreement between the citizens' food committee and the baking industry which would conserve wheat had little influence on the market. Grainmen said that most of the savings plans so far announced do not conserve a great deal of wheat.

Stocks Finish Strong Week

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—The stock market today concluded one of its strongest and speediest weeks of the year with oils, steels and motors extending the upswing by fractions to 2 or more points generally.

Wider movers for the day, a number at 1947 peaks, included Superior Oil of Cal., up 8 points at 129, on only 600 shares; Skelly Oil 2 1/4 at 93 1/2, Seaboard Oil 2 1/2 at 34 1/2, Deep Rock Oil 1 1/2 at 41, International Paper 1 1/2 at 58 1/2, Ex-Cello 1 1/4 at 50 3/4, U. S. Steel 1 1/4 at 75 1/2, General Motors 1 1/2 at 61, American Woolen 1 1/4 at 50 and Santa Fe 1 at 87.

Most of the buoyant rails of the preceding session took a rest. Oils still were propped by mounting crude prices. Expanding production of steel ingots aided stocks in this group.
